Language All Their Own

Is Used by Dog Showmen Most of the terms used by dog lowmen describe physical characteristics of individual dogs.

A dog's head inspires a number of strange words or phrases. A dog with a round head, instead of the usual flat topped one, is "apple headed." A white mark on the face is a "blaze." A "butterfly nose" is one that is spotted, while a "smudge nose" is not spotted, yet not entire-

A pup is "cheeky" if his cheek bumps are prominent. He has a "button ear" if the ear tip droops; a 'tulip ear" if it is erect, and a "rose the inside. The skin of the ear is the "leather. The dog's jaw is "overshot" if the

upper teeth project beyond the lowundershot if the lower teeth project. A "pig jaw" is extremely over-shot. Hounds and many other breeds have "dewlaps," or hanging 'flews," or lip skin. our pup has met with an accident,

Prominent officials discussed cital subjects concerning rural educational work. Teachers' retirement, new rural aid law, standardization, negro education in Texas, objectives of trustee organizations, and new school laws, were some of the important themes considered. One change in standardization beginning in 1938 will be the requirement of three years in colege for every teacher.

County superintendents have been urging state officials not to reduce taxes, thereby curtailing school aid in the future. Proposed cuts would lower the state per capita of \$22 for the ensuing year to a much smaller figure and reduce educational advantages in all common as well as some independent districts.







### Kashmir, Isolated, Has Real Mixture of People

On the southern slopes of the Himalayas lies the native Indian state of Kashmir. It occupies a number of successive steps or valleys, the largest and richest of which is the famous "Vale of Cashmir," approximately eighty miles long and twen-ty-five miles wide. With an average elevation of 6,000 feet, it is surrounded by lofty mountain ranges, and is separated from the plains of northern India by rocky barriers

### Foreign Titles

The Constitution of the United States does not forbid American citizens to take titles or honors from foreign governments despite an agitation in the early part of the last century to put one there. Congress in 1810 submitted to the states a proposed amendment which would have forfeited the American citizenship of any person "who shall accept, claim, receive or retain any title of nobility or honor, or shall, without the consent of Congress, accept and retain any present, penion, office or emolument of any kind whatever, from any emperor, king, prince or foreign power." The amendment could not muster sufficient ratifications among the states, and after 1814 expired without further attention

Deadwood Dick From England

Deadwood Dick was born on De-cember 18, 1845, in England and came to the United States when he was sixteen years old. While he was still a young man he joined a party of prospectors in Illinois and went overland to the Black Hills in search of gold. His real name was Richard Clarke. He was a typical plainsman, swaggering, always ready for excitement, chivalrous and handy with his fists or guns. He drove a stage coach, worked as a miner, rode the Pony Express and was a member of a vigilante

SAFEWAY BEGINS REMODELING OF STORE BUILDING HERE


