trips this year and sponsors expect | Fire Chief Chester Cherry, Jack last Friday from the eighth annual firemen's training school at College Station. Mr. Cherry was an instructor in the advanced course and chairman of the session

The school is conducted each year by the department of chemistry and chemical engineering at A. & M. College and is under the auspices of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas. H. R. Brayton is director. Four hundred and seventy-four firemen and chiefs represented 223 cities at the school. This is an increase of 22 over last year's attendance.

Mr. Cherry and four others won new first aid kits for their discussions of "What Our City Has Done in Fire Prevention.

Experts in the various phases of fire prevention and fire fighting addressed the meeting. These included not only Texas speakers but nationally known authorities on these subjects.

George Clark, of Austin, secretary to Governor Allred and also secretary of the governor's traffic safety committee, brought a message from the chief executive askpreventing traffic accidents. He cited the enormous life and : property loss annually in the United States from this cause. A telegram from President Roosevelt was read in which he, too, asked the cooperation of firemen in this safety campaign.



RIO DE JANEIRO, July 28 .- The coffee growing countries lie within the tropics and coffee grows in both the rainy low latitude and wet and dry low latitude climates. The original home of coffee is Abyssinia and from there it spread east and west around the earth. The habit of coffee drinking spread from Arabia into Turkey and in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries the Coffee House popularized the drinking of coffee in England

William Penn is reported to have paid \$4.68 a pound for coffee, and from that fabulous price its use in America developed until today Americans are the world's greatest coffee drinkers. The French in 1720 introduced coffee to the island of Martinique. From Martinique the Spaniards in 1750 introduced coffee growing to Cuba. Puerto Rico and other island possessions. In 1784 the Spaniards brought coffee to the mainland of South America. Brazil is now the largest producer of coffee in the world and Colombia ranks second.



Picturing illuminated buildings. electric signs, and other night-blooming subjects is simply a matter of time exposure. The camera, of course, must be stationary. Length of exposure depends on the amount and color of light on your subject, and the kind of film used. The chrome type of film is excellent for outdoor night time exposures, as it minimizes flare from strong, exposed lights. Usually, you'll find exposure of from two to five minutes adequat (unless you stop the lens 'way down then you'll need longer time). A if your subject is bathed

CANBERRA, Australia, Aug. 4.-Because snails have become so troublesome in gardens, the government's health officials have imported English thrushes to war on the pests.

The bbirds were obtained in New Zealand, and their presence has resulted in a second war. Those who oppose the plan declare that the thrushes are apt to become a greater pest than the snails. Natural history societies have taken up arms against the invaders.

Basset Hull, secretary of the Royal Zoological Society, of New South Wales, who is leading the attack, believes that the thrushes after eradicating the snails, will create havoc in orchards and hasten the extermination of



## Depth Vision Machine Lloyd, of the Wingate club Received Here to Aid In Traffic Campaign

One of the few depth vision testing machines in the state was received in Ballinger last week and set up in the fire station. This new safety device was purchased by Fire Chief Chester Cherry at the firemen's short course at College Station and presented to the local fire department to aid in the campaign against traffic The machine will be operated

each Tuesday and Thursday nights and Ballinger drivers will have an opportunity to test their eyesight and driving ability free of charge. Only a few of the largest cities in the state have these machines. The one here came from Houston, where 1,516 accidents during the month of June caused that city to enlist the aid of firemen in the campaign.

Consisting of an eye-piece through which the operator sees the image of five miniature cars reflected in a mirror and attempts by means of cords controlling the positions of the automobiles, to align the cars, the machine not only tests the eyesight and ability to distinguish colors but shows the ability to judge distance. Lights are so arranged as to simulate night, twilight and daytime driving conditions.

AUSTIN, August 4.—Shipments cally freezes into immobility. of all classes of Texas livestock during June totaled 8,177 cars, compared with 4.321 cars last year, an increase of 90 per cent, according to a report from the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Cattle shipments of 5,786 cars increased 112 per cent over June last year; calf shipments, 758 cars, increased 33 per cent; and sheep shipments, 1,221 cars increased 136 per cent. Hog shipments totaled 412 cars, a decrease of nearly 20 per cent. Aggregate shipments of Texas

livestock during the first six months of the year were 46,681 cars, against 32,748 cars during the corresponding period last year, an increase of 40 per cent Shipments of cattle to the Fort Worth market were more than double those of June last year and shipments of sheep to this market increased 67 per cent over a year ago.




