

AUSTIN, Sept. 1.—Shipments of poultry and eggs from Texas to nterstate points during July, onal low, were well above those of the corresponding month last year, the University of Texas bureau of business of research has

announced. Poultry shipments totaled 45 cars in July this year, as compared with 32 cars a year ago, a gain of over 40 per cent; and egg shipments for the two comparable months were 40 cars and 31 cars respectively, an increase of nearly 30 per cent.

Only two cars of eggs were brought in from other states, compared with nine cars in July last year.





### MUSIC STORE FOILS

JOHANNESBURG, Union of South Africa, Sept. 1.-By a contrivance known as an audition table a Johannesburg music firm foils those who come to listen, not to buy. The invention does away with stuffy little audition rooms where the listeners keep buyers waiting.

The new device consists fundamentally of a phonograph set in the counter. The music comes from a small amplifier facing the customer who sits in front. By leaning forward he depresses the desk and starts the music. When he leans back he breaks the con-

nection. Any number of the tables can be installed side by side between partitions, and the amplifiers are so adjusted in volume that there is no interference from one booth to the other.




