Stinking smut in wheat hanges the grain into a mass of pores called "smut balls" which have an offensive fishy odor, but are not readily observed in the field. The dusted grain should be kept in a pile, bin, wagon, box or sack for at least 10 hours and during that time the dusted grain left uncovered. Treated seed may then be planted. or stored but not for longer than four weeks. This treatment will not clog or corrode the drill in the least. The treatment is applicable to wheat, oats or barley.
