





#### 4-H Club Girls And **Home Demonstration** Women Tell of Work

Home demonstration club women and 4-H club girls are starting off the fall season with a varied round of projects, as shown by the following accounts of their activi-

To provide adequate and suitable space for storage of her canned products, Mary Lehman, of the Dale 4-H club, is building a ventilated pantry. The pantry is four feet long and two feet wide and built to the ceiling. Shelves are being put in and painted to make the place lighter and cleaner. The ventilation is provided by cutting a square nine inches in the floor near the inside wall and another in the ceiling at the opposite end of the pantry. These are covered with screen and provided with a cover that can be used during the winter. This permits a crosscurrent and makes the pantry several degrees cooler than the air outside the pantry.

Miss Lehman is labeling her shelves and containers and organizing her pantry with each class of vegetables in its place, such as the green or yellow vegetables, other vegetables, fruits, etc.
