



Wallis blue frock designed by Ellen Kaye, and carried a corsage of cream rosebuds.





Working on Device

To Amplify Light

Amplifiers for sound and radio have been built to give magnifications as great as a million billion times. Light rays, on the other hand, cannot be amplified at all. Astronomers wishing to photograph very faint or distant stars have only two expedients. One is to build larger and larger telescopes. The other is to keep the same telescope trained continually on the same star for many hours, so that the faint starlight may have time to register.

There still are many things astronomers want to know; for example, whether there are living creatures on Mars or other planets. For such tasks no telescope is big enough and no photographic exposure is long enough. unless there is some way to amplify light.


