Eight of 13 families exceeded the net income goals they set, and five of 14 families reported gains n net worth or savings of more than \$1,000 each.

Contributions of the farm or ranch to the family living totalled \$14.444, an average of \$722 for each of the 20 farms. In two cases the contributions to the family living exceeded the cash income from the farm.

The group as a whole spent almost as much for automotive transportation as for clothing The families spent an average of \$37 for medical care, \$20 for recreation and \$56 for community welfare

A less complete analysis of the entire group of 363 families in the iemonstrations showed soil conservation or improvement measures, taken on 84 farms and anches, were the most popular projects. Landscaping the home grounds ranked next, 51 families carrying out this project. Eleven of the 51 planted windbreaks, the A. C. Wrights, of Lubbock county setting out 1,000 trees.

Changes in farm or ranching operations carried out in accordance with the goals included addiion of better breeding stock, evelopment of home orchards hange to pure line or pedigreed eeds and improvement of pas-

Demonstrators built a total of 12 new homes, three new rent houses and 42 new farm structures. They also added a total of 61 new bedrooms, bathrooms clothes closets or pantries to their homes and repaired 34 farm buildings. New equipment added by the 363 families included 15 new water systems, 13 lighting systems, three sewer systems, five water tanks for livestock, 20 trench silos, nine pieces of farm equipment and many miles of fencing.

Striking results reported on individual demonstrations included those of Lee Stewart, of Wood county, who found that his five acres of fruit trees and grapes netted him a profit of \$209 while his 24 acres in cotton brought him

Archa D. Smith, of Harris county more than doubled the carrying capacity of his 23-acre pasture by grubbing out underbrush and mowing the weeds. He found that cotton he fertilized yielded 1,006 pounds an acre while unfertilized portions of his field produced only 513 pounds an acre. His cotton earned a premium of \$4 a bale because he planted pedi-

The W. R. Treeces, of Sherman county, reaped 171/2 bushels of wheat an acre on a 400-acre tract they terraced. The crop on an adjoining, unterraced field was abandoned because there wasn't



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


