Area rodeo competitors make presence known at HPJRA season finals

CLOVIS, NM -Area youth joined over 400 cowboys and cowgirls from Eastern New Mexico and West Texas at the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association's finals here last weekend.

Among the local winners at the HPJRA finals was Sterling Via, 8-year-old son of Guy Walt and Jan Via of Lazbuddie. Sterling was the HPJRA reserve all-around champion in the 8 -under division for the year and won a saddle for his efforts.

HPJRA is a rodeo organization for school-aged youths, 5-19. The organization claims 497 members, who compete

from the last of April until the latter part of July at HPJRA rodeos across the area in order to qualify for the finals. The finals were held at the Curry County Mounted Patrol Arena in Clovis.

To qualify for the HPJRA finals, the youngsters must collect at least one point in any HPJRA rodeo held during the season. Points are given for first through 10th place.

The top two cowboys and cowgirls in each age division collecting the most points for the season receive year-end allaround saddles.

Ogallala Aquifer management plan being developed

Regional water leaders are currently working to develop a High Plains Ogallala Regional Water Management Plan.

The reason this is being done is that water from the Ogallala Aquifer is being used faster than it is being naturally recharged, and there are limited opportunities for the development of additional surface water reservoirs to satisfy the needs of a growing municipal population.

The area is unique in as much as it has a large regional

aquifer, the Ogallala, and several public surface water reservoirs whose combined yields have historically provided an adequate water supply to satisfy the water needs of the residents of the towns and cities in

In addition to supplying a portion of the municipal water needs of the citizens of the area, the aquifer has historically provided enough water be abundant. to supplement the precipitation received in the area to the

have been able to produce large, dependable crop yields over a long period of time.

Agriculture, the largest water user, provides the principal economic base for the region.

To further complicate the depletion problem, the aquifer varies in thickness throughout the region. Even prior to largescale development, some areas ground water appeared to

Forty to fifty years of use of water from the aquifer has re-

the ground water reserves throughout most of the region. This partial depletion has resulted in declines in well yields, especially in the thinner sec-

tions of the aquifer. Farmers' use of improved water conservation equipment and technology has helped to offset the well yield declines, making sufficient water available for the crops. Crop yields have remained high for most crops grown in the area as a tion water-use efficiency beresult of this effort.

As an example, a well pro-

ducing 1,000 gallons per minute from which the water being applied was only 60 percent efficient would only make 600 gallons a minute available to the crop being irrigated, whereas a well producing 700 gallons per minute which is being used with equipment that is 95 percent efficient would make 665 gallons per minute available to the crop.

came very evident during the 1980s. From 1980 to 1990, rises of the water levels in the aquifer occurred over approximately 50 percent of the area.

Improved water-use efficiency, above-average precipitation, and acreage enrolled in the Conversation Reserve Program contributed to reducing the long-term depletion rate.

Additionally, the amount of natural recharge to the aquifer undoubtedly was above normal during this periods of above-average precipitation.

Unfortunately, the weather cycle in the area has changed again from wet to dry. During the first half of the 1990s, a drought occurred in the region. The deficit in the amount of precipitation received had to

be satisfied with water pumped from the aquifer; and also little or no water was available from precipitation for natural recharge to the aquifer.

Water levels in the aquifer again began to fall, as did the levels in the public surface water supply reservoirs. Larger amounts of ground water had to be pumped for municipal uses to offset reduced reserves in the surface water reservoirs. Droughts occur and reoccur in the region at unpredictable frequencies, as do above-average precipitation events.

A rapidly declining water base will hinder the growth and development in the region, plus reduce the opportunities to maintain a strong agricul-

tural economic base.

Regional water users can reduce the rate of depletion of the water supply by being more efficient water users. The region's water supply can be

increased by implementing a precipitation enchancement program.

(Increasing precipitation will reduce the demand on the ground water reserves, increase

the catchment in the surface water reservoirs, and increase the natural recharge to the aquifer.)

When completed, the regional water management plan should provide the guidance and encouragement necessary

to insure the region's water supply base for many years into the future.

The region being addressed is a 22 million acre area in 46 High Plains of Texas counties. Lubbock and Amarillo are the

two largest cities in the region. The final plan document should be completed in about two

years. However, work has already begun on implementing programs and activities to accomplish the group's objectives.

In his fine volume on church history Bruce Shelley includes a letter written by a young mother in 1573 to the infant daughter she would never, in this life, know. The lady was in prison awaiting execution, the same death her husband had already tasted.

I was touched by the poignancy of her words: "My dearest child, the true love of God strengthen you in virtue, you who are yet so young, and whom I must leave in this wicked, evil, perverse world.

"Oh, that it had pleased the Lord that I might have brought you up, but it seems that it is not the Lord's will.... Be not ashamed of us; it is the way which the prophets and the apostles went. Your dear father demonstrated with his blood that it is the genuine faith, and I also hope to attest the same with my blood...well knowing that we shall meet hereafter."

Executions are never pleasant, however just, but the killing of this little girl's parents seems especially obscene. Their only crime was being so firm in their faith that they dared to disagree with powerful authorities.

Who were their executioners? Godless pagans? Angry infidels? Devilish kings? No. Their executioners were the very people who have always been the worst persecutors of Christian people, the ones who have let the most blood, spewed forth the most venomous words, and hated with the most zeal-other Christians.

Why do we so often "settle" religious differences by swinging swords in irreligious ways? How much martyr's blood has been spilled at church business meetings! How many have had their reputation burned at the stake by believers across town-or across the pew!

May God grant that young woman's prayer and teach us "the true love of God." May He open our ears to the strong words of the Apostle John: "If any one says, 'I love God,' and hates his brother, he is a liar" (1 John 4:20).

The acid test of how genuinely I love God is this: How well do I love my brother?

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
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
