





VOLCANO PERILS FARMS IN ARGENTINE PROVINCE



MOSCOW, Sept. 27.-To help in he development of the reindeer breeding industry more than one hundred specialists have been sent the Far North by Soviet authorities. In northern Yakutia, n Krasnoyarsk territory and in the Omsk region, routes have been established over which thousands of reindeer carry freight to distant places.

Up to 175,000 skins yearly are obtained from reindeer, which furnish suede and other articles. The new group supplements the expeditions already at work studying the contagious diseases that beset the deer. Color Blind Victim In Picking Stamps

LONDON, Sept. 27 .- A new handicap of color-blind people is complained of by an anonymous victim, in a recent letter to the London Times He cannot pick out the different denominations of English postage stamps. In the present set of stamps, bearing the portrait of the former King Edward, now the Duke of Windsor, one of those most often used, the one and one-half pence or threecent, is of reddish brown color. Another the one-half penny or one cent, is green. The one penny is a brighter red.

As the complainant points out, the red-brown one and one-half pence and the green penny look almost exactly the same to a person whose eyes cannot distinguish red and green, with the bright red one-penny but little different. All three designs are almost identical. The value is printed on each stamp, but the figures are small and inconspicu ous. To the victim of this kind of color blindness the orange color ordinarily used for British twopence stamps and the blue color of the two and one-half pence are easily distinguished but might be confused by a person with the rarer type of color blindness who cannot see yellows and blues.

In the United States, the green color of the one-cent stamp and the red one of the two-cent might be confused by persons with redgreen color blindness, or the blue five-cent and the yellow six-cent by persons of the other color blind type, but practical trouble is avoided by difference in the portraits or other features of design. 

Sewing Clothes Electrically Speeds Work and Eases Toil

But it becomes even more of a chore during the school term when the youngsters more than ever must e neatly and carefully dressed. Undoubtedly, this is one of the principal reasons why a sewing machine still is considered a real household necessity by three of every four families living in rural areas.

Of course, there are other explana-tions for the continued popularity of this century-old household appliance. Despite the universal availability of cheap ready-to-wear clothing, many farm wives—especially those with large families—find it more econom-ical to make many clothes at home. Then too, home sewing makes it pos-sible to obtain an individuality of styling and design not usually found in cheaper ready-made articles.

Unfortunately for the womenfolk of the farm, a Government study shows that only from 10 to 30 per cent of the sewing machines in rural homes throughout the country are electrically driven. A foot-operate machine is tiresome to run and this lessens the amount of sewing which can be done in a given time. Als because of its necessarily irregular operation, such a machine seldor produces articles as perfectly finishe as does one driven by electricity.




