SALT LAKE CITY.-Evidence that a tribe of head hunting Indians

Illustrated with photographs and original drawings to prove his the-Active members are: Mmes. Bankston, E. S. Cox, O. C. Sykes, published by the Utah State Historical society

Included in the manuscript is a photograph and description of a crude petroglyph that shows two warriors returning from a raiding party carrying a human head. Utah's petroglyphs, or rock pictures, are remarkably well pre-served, Beckwith found. Cut in the rock walls and cliffs with a sharp instrument, their age has been vari-

ously estimated as 600 to 1,200 years. They served the ancient tribes as guides and records. Reconstructing their mode of life from the picture records they left, Beckwith believes that the head hunting tribe belonged to the Pueblo race and that for a brief period in their tribal life they took heads, instead of scalps, as trophies of vic-







Army Will Spend Million A Month to Recapture Lost Superiority.

WASHINGTON. - More than a million dollars a month will be spent during the next year to increase facilities of the Wright Field army plant, Wright Field, Ohio, in a vigorous attempt by the United States army to equal Germany's strength in the air.

Within two years the air corps will spend \$300,000,000 in its research and rehabilitation program, in a drive to recapture technical

superiority for this country.







ORCHARDS WITHOUT MONEY IS PROBLEM FOR CLUBBERS

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 11 --Securing an orchard with a little money is not always easy, but lack of capital is a problem 4-H club girls of Texas are meeting successfully, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the Texas A. & M. College extension service.

For example, 6,800 berry sprouts were planted last year by 4-H club girls in Cooke county, and from these over 5,000 berry vines are now growing. These same girls put out 4,260 grape cuttings resulting in 1,500 grape vines. All this has been accomplished with little or no expense.

Miss Nette Shultz, Cooke county home demonstration agent, has reported that berry sprouts were given to the club members by orchard owners when they plowed out their rows. Last summer these girls saved 17,000 seed from peaches which they covered with dirt and kept moist all during the summer months. These were planted after fall rains, and in the spring club members reported 1,000 seedlings, excellent nuclei for home orchards.

Some of the members were able to buy a total of 200 trees and 300 vines, so that they will have actier production

Inspections of common district schools in Runnels county were completed last Friday, Miss Kathryn Henderson, deputy state superintendent, visiting the schools in company with E. C. Grindstaff county superintendent. Included in the list visited were several of the smaller independent district schools of the county.

Miss Henderson was well pleased with the findings in the Runnels county schools and commented on several improvements. Interiors of a number of the buildings have been refinished during the summer to improve lighting and make the rooms more suitable for study Visual aid and film projectors have been installed in several schools and these received praise from the inspector.

The state inspector particularly pointed out that practically every teacher in the common district schools who did not hold a college degree had attended some school the past summer, working towards

LOTUS PLANTS GROWN FROM ANCIENT SEEDS

BALTIMORE, Oct. 11 .- Five lotus seedlings on display in Hikiya Park, Tokyo, have been grown by American-trained Dr. Ichiro Oga from seeds he found in a Manchurian peat bog where they had been for about 400 years. Dr. Oga has been making a study of the lotus for a long time.

At Johns Hopkins University he proved that lotus seeds from Pulantien, Manchuria, were not over 10,000 years old as was believed by many, but only four centuries old. He asserts, however, that seeds obtained from a spot near Mukden, Manchuria, will live 1,500 years more.


