5 NYA Projects Finished In County in Six Months

Five NYA projects have been Women and Girls June 1, 1939. One project, started at Maverick on July 1, 1939, was the construction of a rock veneer community center and other work on the school grounds. A total of 45' youths was employed * there until November 12 when the job was completed. Federal funds put in this project totalled \$2,581 and the sponsor's part was \$369.50.

An addition to the Latin American school in Ballinger ws started, in the early fall and somewhat of a record was made in the time required for this job. The federal appropriation for this project was \$2,169 but actually only \$526 was spent. Due to the speed made by the supervisor \$1,643 was saved in labor costs. The sponsor spent \$544.

An addition to the Ballinger negro school was started on September 25 and completed in one month. Cost to the federal government on the was \$392 and the sponsor's part was \$284. A total of 45 boys were employed on each of these projects.

One of the largest NYA projects in the county was the native stone vocational woodwork shop at Norton. The federal government spent \$1,963 and the sponsor \$1,227. The construction gave employment to 35 youths for more than six months being completed on July 15, 1939.

Project No. 11333 at Norton was started July 1, 1939, and completed July 15, 1939. It provided work for 45 boys on a homemaking educational center and cost the federal agency \$3,212 and the sponson \$1,466. A total of 10,404 man-hours were required in the building

At present the NYA is constructing a wood and metal working shop on the court house lawn in Ballinger. A crew of 45 is being employed and the work will continue several months. After completion it will be equipped with machinery and employment given a number of boys throughout the
