# Cotton is Major Surplus Item Used in Sewing Room

King Cotton, one of the major surplus items which the state of Five Political Texas has been instrumental in supplying to the world market, has a staunch friend in the sewing room project in Ballinger.

Thousands of yards of cotton material are used each month in district 19, which includes Runnels county. Consequently a huge bite for distribution to destitute their last appeals to the voters.

Present production plans for the sewing rooms require that approximately 100 yards of cotton material be used each month for each worker assigned to the project.
