Jouett said the 45 plane manufacturing plants in the United States could produce the 50,000 planes by: Tripling floor space in all

2. Doubling the area of aircraft engine manufacturing plants. 3. Tripling the number of employees, now estimated at 100,000 for all the branches of the industry. 4. Operating all plants on a 24hour basis.

Various persons in aviation circles agreed that mass production of airplanes, already accomplished in Germany, would result. Because the majority of the planes would be the same type, they said, the same tools and dies could be used over a




