

## 5.000 BRITISH CHILDREN GET WARM COATS AS 'BUNDLES' GIFT



NIGHT is drawing nigh," and with other thousands in the British Isles these children are entering an underground air-raid shelter "somewhere in England," in care of their guardian as little ones do every time the sirens shriek and every night. Most of them must sleep on concrete or dirt floors, frequently with nothing more than a blanket under them. Bundles for Britain is making garments and seeking funds to purchase children's cots for use in these shelters through its 300-odd branches over the nation.

NEW YORK—Through an immediate response to a cable request, some 5,000 destitute children of the war-ravaged British Isles today are equipped with warm coats for winter. The garments were purchased in London at a cost of \$10,606.77, with funds cabled from

Inc., to meet the emergency. The request came from Mrs. Edward Murrow, who with the Dowager Marchioness of Reading, is supervising the needs of civilians in England as the represendesperate need among these un-fortunate children." A large num-




