In the same period, 5,223 of the women and girls reporting kept individual clothing accounts and 1,445 kept family clothing

In 1941, 13,651 girls out of 23,634 enrolled completed their goals in clothing. This represented 57.7 per cent completions compared with 54.6 per cent in 1940, the increase being accounted for by 677 more completions out of practically the same enrollment in both years. There was no increase in the number of counties doing regular girls' clothing work, the

Texas Club Boys Receive \$617,076 For '41 Products

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 4. Texas 4-H club boys received a total of \$617,076.24 in 1941 from the sale of livestock, poultry, wool and mohair. According to L. L. Johnson, state boys' club agent and J. W. Potts, assistant, this represented approximately 78 per cent of the return to the 18,164 boys who completed their demonstrations during the year.

As heretofore, beef calves topped the list with \$400,393.49, or nearly two-thirds of the total. Swine was second with receipts of \$120,-609.31, and poultry took fourth place after sheep with returns of \$14,709.04. Johnson pointed out, however, that the receipts for poultry represented only birds sold for food and did not include the large volume of eggs produced and sold by club boys demonstrating in poultry.

These sales, exclusive of some \$30,000 in prizes, were the largest in the history of boys' 4-H club work in Texas. This was due, Johnson says, to better prices and better quality in the products.



children in the household. That's a warning from Dosca Hale, extension service specialist in parent education and child development, who says calm cour-Ladies' Bible Class, Monday at age in adults will save children from much fear and worry.

"In these perilous times one of the greatest hazards we face is the threat to family life," the specialist says. "So time spent in learning to understand the First, third and fifth Sundays needs of children under rapidly shifting conditions is time well invested for the protection of our homes and the future security of

this nation." She points out that adults are being called on to spend more and more time outside the home on defense jobs, and to meet this situation children should be shown that if they take on more home responsibilities they are helping in the defense program. There are many other ways in which small children may help. For example, they can save waste paper and help get it delivered to the proper authorities. They can help to save light and heat by turning off unnecessary lights and stoves and by reminding others to do so.

Most important of all is the feeling this work gives the child the feeling that he is needed and that he, along with all the other people around him, is doing his bit in the great victory program, the specialist explains.

Experiment Station Seed Are Available In Small Quantities

Texas blight resistant maize eed, hegari and kaffir seed can be supplied to a limited number of Runnels county farmers for planting demonstration patches in 1942. Supt. D. L. Jones, of the Lubbock experiment station, made this fact known to County Agent John Barton in a recent letter.

Mr. Barton stated that the purpose of securing such seed each year is to establish foundation eed patches and to prove the importance of planting pure line and well bred seed.

The cost of the seed for 1942 will be 41/2 cents a pound and those who are interested in securing small amounts are asked to see Mr. Barton or Gray McKown and leave name and amount wanted. Texas hybrid corn, No. 8, is a sur-cropper type, yellow in color, Army-Navy Club and can also be obtained through

Nail extractors, bird cages swinging berths, ant traps, beer coolers and portable fences were others patented early by Texans. In addition there was a bedspread developed by Thomas B. Baldwin of Marshall, in 1871.


