Runnels County's Seed Dealers Said Complying With Law


Seed dealers in Runnels county are cooperating with the state department of agriculture in an effort to protect the farmer from crop losses because of unreliable seed, John W. Young, inspector for the seed laboratory, stated

A check-up of local seed houses showed that dealers generally are complying with the seed law by offering for sale only seed that is tested and tagged.

"Farmers of Texas will plant seed valued at several million dollars within the next few months," the inspector said. "Before buying, the farmer should examine the tag on each bag of seed so that he will know the purity and the germination. The Cexas seed law, as revised by the st legislature, demands that all ed be tested and tagged, and hat the tag state specifically the purity, germination and noxious weed seed content."

The state seed laboratory at Austin will test the seed, free of charge, for any citizen of Texas. At a recent meeting of seed




