



Food was made more nutritious, palatable and economical by following improved practices in preparation. This help was given through 7,447 methed demonstrations by county home demonstration agents, specialists and leaders, 5,503 visits to homes, 1,501 other meetings, and by means of

Service of meals was improved by following simple rules and making the food and table attractive in the homes of 18,571 club women in 173 counties and 13,687 4-H club girls in 131 counties. County home demonstration agents helped 3,694 families of club women in 125 counties and 1,812 families of club girls in 82 counties in table service through visits to homes. These 4-H club girls prepared 398,910 dishes and planned and served 166,624 meals.

Assistance was given to 4,460 families in child feeding; 3,977 aided in corrective feeding for overweight, underweight, pellagra, and other nutritional disorders, and 7,005 club women report adopting food buying recommendations in 1941. School lunches were improved in 14,406 families

of home demonstration club women in 144 counties and in 6,538 families of 4-H club girls in 81 counties. At the same time, 2,193 schools were assisted with the hot dish and school lunch
