Failure to file that list is a violation of the general maximum price regulation and the local board has been advised that the general office is now making a survey to determine merchants who have not filed the list. The result of the survey is to be turned over to the OPA compliance and investigation department for immediate attention.

Merchants can still get the booklet, "What Every Retail Merchant Should Know About GMPR," by calling at the office of the board in the court house.


