#### **Tire Inspections** Are Compulsory By January 31

Oscar Harber, clerk of the Runnels county rationing board, calls attention of all automobile owners that all tires must be inspected by an authorized station not later than January 31. Part of the registration blank for each car was retained by the owner and this form must be taken to the inspector so that a report can be made on every tire.


Practically all tire dealers and many filling stations have qualified before the board for this. Monday service which is a rigid requirement of the gasoline rationing plan. Unless tires are inspected it will prevent further supplying of gas for the automobile.


