

Take Care of your GAS RANGE



1. Don't load the oven-door with heavy roasts, as you put them in or take them out. It might warp the door.

2. The oven-lining will last longer if you roast meats at low temperatures (from 250° to 325°). 3. Wipe off spilled foods at once with a dry cloth. Wait till

enamel is cold, before using a damp cloth. And protect the top surface with asbestos mats. 4. If foods should boil over and

clog the burner (never necessary on modern ranges, because there's a simmer burner to prevent that), clean the ports lightly with a thin wire.

Break noodles in 1-inch pieces; cook in boiling salted water till tender. Drain well, and add cheese, salt and pepper. Add beaten eggs and milk, and mix well. Pour into greased shallow baking dish and bake at 325° for 45 minutes. Garnish with the bacon.

* * Why not cook the bacon in the oven, along with the custard? Spread it on a cakerack that fits over a pan to catch the grease, and at 325° the bacon will brown perfectly (and stay flat) in 15 to 20 minutes. Don't let grease fall on the oven floor.

Boys to Receive V-12 Tests for Enlistment In Armed Services

Examinations wil be given at the Ballinger high school on April Sunday 2 for boys wishing to enlist in class V-12 for the army, navy, coast guard or marine corps. In each group, any boy who will be 17 by July 1, 1943, and not more than 20 for the navy, marines or coast guard, and not more than 22 for the army, is eligible to take these tests.

A number of boys in the Ballinger high school are planning to Monday: take the examinations and others here out of school but within the age limits also may take the tests. Those who pass will be given an Wednesday:

interview and physical examination later by officers of the unit expressed preference for, and if J. C. JOHN they pass the physicals will be given at least 16 months in some school. Later they will be given Sunday, March 21, 1943: special officers training and commissioned in the unit in which they enlist. Those who enter and fail will go into service at lower rank in the branch they specify.

After they pass the interview and physicals, the boys will be inducted into the service through the regular channels, uniformed, assigned to a school and given \$50 per month, board, room, tuition and other expenses. Medical and dental students will get to complete their education under this plan.

Any local boys with the ages, 17 to 22 for the army, and 17 to 20 for the navy, coast guard or marines, who would like to take the first examinations, can get full particulars from Supt. Nat Williams.

Boys entering school in July under this plan will be eligible for football and other sports next fall. They may also specify the school of their choice and if there is a vacancy they may be assigned there.
