American highway, are nearing completion and are soon to foin into the great north and south thoroughfares as tourist avenues with new resort centers for tourists after the war according to the survey bureau of an American travel agency.

The main route, which will traverse the extremes of latitude and longitude, is a stretch of 13,794 miles from Fairbanks, Alaska, to Buenos Aires and will total 15,494 miles by its Rio de Janeiro extension. From the Colombia-Peru border the road is completed through Lima, Santiago, Buenos Aires and north to Rio de Janeiro. Among the extension roads soon to be finished is the link from Palmira, Colombia, to Buenaventura on the Pacific.

Already functioning are the secondary roads around Maracaibo and Puerto Cabello in Venezuela. 
