



The seed of this variety is scarce and none can be obtained from the Texas experiment stations. At this time the only seed available is a small amount located at the General Mills, Inc. Wichita Falls.

Recleaning, grading and smut treatment are practices recommended by the county agent for increasing yields as well as quality In 1937 smut took a toll of \$50,000 worth of wheat, but through a program of treatment during the past several years this loss has been reduced to a minimum. Mr. Barton stated that this year of all years smut treatment should be given in order to insure maximum production at a time when it is needed most.


