



#### REMAINS OF PREHISTORIC 3-EYED REPTILE UNEARTHED IN HOWARD COUNTY QUARRY

AUSTIN. Nov. 17 .- A prehistorio three-eyed cousin of the salamander is the latest inhabitant of the paleontology collection of the Texas Memorial Museum, on the University of Texas campus, Dr. E H. Sellards, director, has revealed.

This ancestor of the modern Stamp out Hitlerism with war salamander-also related to the frog or toad-is about six feet long, and probably weighed nearly 300 pounds, Dr. Sellards explained A "third eye" is found near the base of the skull, much smaller than the two normal eyes near the nostrils.

> Other characteristics of the prehistoric monster were a huge, flat skull, a "breastplate" upon which university scientists believe he probably rested his weight when not in motion, a short lizard-like tail and short legs.

> Skeletal remains of several of these animals were found by university paleontologists in a deserted quarry in Howard county. By natching them together, a surprisingly complete skeleton was assembled and reconstructed.
