Sixty-two of the 5019 loan ership program authorized by congress in the Bankhead-Jones tenant purchase act. The borrower has up to 40 years to repay his loan, at 3% interest. However, many wil repay much sooner, using the variable payment plan which enables them to make larger payments in good years and smaller payments in bad years. Fourteen repaid their loans in full during the year.

The bulk of the loans were made under the FSA rural rehabilitation program. These loans may run for five years, at five per cent interest. They are to finance purchase of livestock, equipment and small improvements to get the little farmer into capacity production. FSA is not only economically sound from the standpoint of the gov ernment getting its money back from the borrowers, but it is raising the living standard of hundreds of American farin

FSA supervisors at the Ruidoso meeting were told by Regional Director Ray E. Davis to be ready to assume an even bigger role in American agriculture when at the end of the war the government begins assisting returning veterans to establish themselves on familytype farms.




