Fighter Pilot is **Speaker for Clubs** Friday, Tuesday

Questions also dealth with the cover flown for large bomber formations, the most frequent work of the 8th air force. He was asked many questions in regard to strafing and support of ground forces in various kinds of battles

Considerable Growth Made by REA Lines Since Start in 1938

The Coleman County Electric Co-op, Inc., rendered a total of 2,100 bills on December 20, 1944, revealing the great growth along the lines since the first was built in 1938. S. R. Hale, superintendent, with headquarters in Cole man, disclosed this week the growth of the units during recent years and added that additional extensions had been approved and

would be built in the near future The first section was organized in November, 1938, with about 125 members. The second section of 168 miles was completed May, 1939, with 220 members. The third was energized in September, 1939, with 175 members and the fourth section of 200 miles started operation in November, 1939, with 264 members. This gave a total membership served by the REA lines in December, 1939, of 784 members. Since then many more patrons have been added until the recent billings of the past December showed the peak of 2,100.

All extension and service rendered members since December, 1942, has been on the animal unit basis as approved by the war production board to the amount of 286 miles and 697 members. In preparation for this all lines must be measured correctly and an estimate work order prepared, then same is presented to WPB for approval. All material of every description must be purchased under priority rating with all "i's' dotted and "t's" crossed. All poles, transformers, meters, conductors poles, hardware are then checked to the contractor.

In addition to the above summary the co-op has approximately 30 miles with 60 members approved and ready for construction as a continuation of applicaions on the U-L-C unit basis. The co-op has 800 paid applications for post-war extensions on area coverage basis and expects to serve every unelectrified home when material is available.

Officers of the company are asking that every farmer within the bounds of a project who wants electric service to either Sunday, January 7 come to the office and make application or see Mark Davis. Ballinger; Raymond Lloyd, Winters; or H. E. Petty, Maverick This should be done during this month, February or March.


