

Dr. J. W. Macune

Dr. J. W. Macune, 63, practicing

Born at Cameron on January 9 1882, decedent was graduated from the Southern Methodist Uniersity medical school in 1913. For short time he was located in Milam county before going to Eagle Pass. During World War I e served as a first lieutenant in he army medical corps and was at Newport News, Virginia, when the armistice was signed.

In 1924 he and his family moved o Ballinger and for a few years he was associated with the Halley & Love Sanitarium, after which he maintained a downtown office for a general practice of medicine. Dr. Macune had an extensive practice and during the years did much charity work especially among the Latin-American citizens of this area. For the past twelve years he served as county and city health officer.

In addition Dr. Macune assisted organizations in crippled children's work and in anti-tuberculosis campaigns, especially for the education of the public, and in numerous other capacities.

A member of the local post of the American Legion, he had been active in the veterans' organization since coming to Ballinger.

Survivors besides the wife include a son, Donnell H. Macune, A.M.M. ic, U. S. navy, who came here prior to his father's death from Alameda, California; a daughter, Miss Aleda Macune, Ballinger; a brother, Rev. D. Macune, San Antonio; two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Johnson, Port Arthur; and Miss Katherine Macune, Fort Worth. Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 in the Newby-Davis chapel, Rev.
