Contests have been started in three divisions for whites, negroes and Mexicans. The garden club is offering prizes for the best improvements in front yards and the firemen are offering prizes in each group for the best improvements made in back yards and

Those who have made inspections state that there is more work to be done in Ballinger this year than ever before. Two reasons are given for this condition. Rains have been plentiful and practically every week since Easter, causing grass and weeds to grow fast. The other reason is the limited number of yard workers.

Many yards which have been properly kept in the past are in poor condition now because labor cannot be obtained at any price for taking care of yards. Home owners also are very busy and do not have as much time as in the past to do yard work and garden-

In each group prizes will be paid \$3, first; \$2, second; and \$1, third. Similar prizes will be paid by the Civic-Garden Club for front yard improvement and by the firemen for back yard and alley improvement. This makes a total of \$36 offered in cash prizes for those who do yard and alley work to show the best improvement.

Inspections are being made now and will be made again in May 5 to determine winners.

Chief Chester Cherry said that in some sections of the city good work was already underway, particularly in the negro and Mexican sections. He pointed to the vacant lots now growing wild in weeds and stated that later in the summer these would be eyesores as well as fire hazards unless clean-up work is done soon.
