The following the full quota for Runnels county regulations govern sending papers before Saturday night, the last to men in these branches of the service. The rules do not apply to army personnel

1. Individual copies of newspapers and magazines offered for mailing by publishers, addressed via the fleet post offices at New York or San Francisco to navy, marine corps and coast guard personnel on duty overseas, shall be accepted only when they are being sent in fulfillment of written request initiated by the addressees for subscription or

This drive netted about \$50,000 and with the city quota still short \$40,000 the salesmen sallied out Tuesday with good results. Ballinger's E bond quota was \$319,194 and the overall \$495,978.

> From Zweifel on in, we took over houses and put our installations in basements. Some were nice houses from which we ran the German civilians and some were mere hulls of homes where the people had been killed or had left when the fighting got too hot. In every set-up, there were miles and miles of field wires to be got in. Although oftentimes we were about to drop with fatigue, through rain, and shellfire, we always got the job done.

"Zweifel is where our division made the much-written-about Hurtgen Forest fight. Our regiments fought enemy divisions and our divisions fought corps but we beat 'em, but at the cost of thousands of men. Our next best fights were Luxembourg (during the German breakthrough), and, of course, Utah


