The 128 boys attending showed plainly that they had a good time and were busy most of the time here, taking only a few hours out for sleep.





### **Buick Prepares Big Expansion Program**; First Cars October 1

Arthur Underwood, local Buick dealer, has been informed that the Buick division of Gneral Motors Corporation is now engaged in a great expansion program which leads to reconversion and the manufacture of new passenger cars. The first post-war cars will be distributed among dealers already established. Mr. Underwood has maintained the Buick agency here and is in line for some of the first cars off the line.


