

Ballinger Lawyers For Supreme Court State Amendment

One of the four constitutional amendments to be voted on at the special election to be held August 25, 1945, concerns the membership of the supreme court of Texas. Under the provisions of the constitution of 1876 the supreme court consists of three members. Prior to 1918, on account of the rapid growth of the state and the increased litigation, the supreme court could not keep up with its work. The legislature of 1918 created a statutory court known as the commission of appeals to aid the supreme court in the disposition of its business. For the past twenty-seven years the supreme court and the commission of appeals have gradually caught up with the work of the supreme court. Throughout the twenty-seven years approximately two-thirds of the work of the supreme court has been done by judges who have no authority to

There are four states in the union, one of which is Texas, wherein the power of the supreme court is in the hands of only three judges. Twenty-seven of the other forty-four states place the power of the supreme court in the hands of seven or more judges.
