Lee gathered the cotton on his Maverick farm and ginned the first bale at the Morrison gin here Thursday of last week.

Both bales were sold to Hill Hampton the past week-end and brought 21 cents per pound. The No. 1 bale weighed 507 pounds and the No. 2 480 pounds. Checks for the lint, seed and all totalled \$241.12.

Mr. Lee said he had considerable cotton open at this time but that his crop was hardly as good as last year, having been reduced by dry weather. He added that there was no leaf worm damage in his section and that no other insects were working in cotton fields there.

Ginners of the county are about ready to open their plants and expect good runs, equal to last year and in some communities better. Most ginning centers in the county have received first bales of the 1945 crop.

Experience last year taught us to use canned food if at all possible, or at least, it is essential to pack the foods in tight metal containers. Reports from service men indicate that goods not sealed in cans was usually molded, infested with insects, soaked in oil or water, or dried out and old. Also it was found that foods ordinarily canned were better than unusual foods. This will be even more important this year with the bulk of the packages going to the Pacific where the climate and distance of travel will be harder on the packages.

When sending food to the serviceman, it is best to send i variety of things unless he has asked for one specific food. Some women planned a menu on this order: I can turkey, 1 cranberry sauce, I nuts, I plum pudding
