





We have your letter of the twenty-eighth inquiring as to the State Farm Fire Insurance Company of Bloomington, Ill., writing insurance at rates lower than those prescribed by this Department, and wish to refer you to the attached copy of Article 4879 of the Insurance Laws, which we think will be self-explanatory. In other words, the rates fixed by the Department are the maximum rates that companies may charge for fire and windstorm insurance, but companies are given the option, as stated in the article, of making reduced rate filings under the conditions outlined in the article.

The above company is licensed to do business in Texas and among several fillings this company has on file with us is one agreeing to write fire, windstorm, and extended coverage at rates 20% less than rates prescribed by us on all classes of property in Texas, and they are, therefore, within their rights in so writing their policies.

Art. 4879. Maximum rate fixed. A maximum rate of premiums to be charged or collected by all companies transacting in this State the business of fire insurance, as herein defined, shall be exclusively fixed and determined and promulgated by the State Fire Insurance Commission, and no such fire insurance company shall charge or collect any premium or other compensation for or on account of any policy or contract of fire insurance as herein defined in excess of the maximum rate as herein provided for, but may write insurance at a less rate than the maximum rate as herein provided for; when insurance is written for less than the maximum rate, such lesser rate shall be applicable to all risks of the same character situated in the same community. 



Grubs Appearing In Beef and Dairy Cattle of County

County Agent John A. Barton reported this week that cattle grubs are appearing in Runnels county beef and dairy cattle and pointed out that severe losses to producers result from this cause. He reminds cattlemen that now is a good time to treat stock for groups and urges that close inspections be made of all herds.

Mr. Barton issued the following statement relative to cattle grubs and the method of treatment: Experiment station records show that beef cattle will gain from 1/4 to ½ lb. per head less and require 15% more feed when severe infestation of the grub is present. When such cattle are sold on the market they again suffer an average loss of \$3.86 by actual figures on 840,000 head of grubby cattle that are sold on the Fort Worth market each year.

In dairy cattle the immediate loss is in milk, losing from 10% to 25%, as well as requiring some 15% more feed per cow.

Following the invasion of France the speaker worked with the resistance movement or "underground" most of the time, seeking information which would help in the progress of the war and save American lives. He gave specific instances where information was passed on that saved lives and

equipment for the allied armies. Part of his work was with evasion, seeking out those who had aided allied airmen to escape from occupied countries. He told how the flyers were found by loyal people, hidden in their homes, provided with clothing, papers, and eventually taken on bicycles to neutral countries and returned to England. In this he stated that one of the most important items was transportation and that the evasion workers experienced considerable trouble because few Americans could ride bicycles.




