



SOME OF FINEST X-RAY EQUIPMENT IN COUNTRY SERVES AT UNIVERSITY

AUSTIN, Dec. 19 .- In the physics department laboratory at the University of Texas some of the finest X-ray equipment to be found in the country is in use daily by students and professors, says Dr. M. Y. Colby, chairman of the department.

"X-ray touches every part of life," Dr. Colby says, "in the fields of industry, medicine, and science. Qualitative and quantitative analysis of substances by means of X-rays is rapidly developing into an important field of research, and in the field of chemistry we find X-ray being used widely." "X-rays are of the same nature as radio waves, heat waves, and light waves, differing only in wave length," the physicist says. "While radio waves are a few hundred feet in length, X-ray waves are a billionth of an inch or less in

Among its many uses Dr. Colby listed the significance of radiology in the treatment of cancer and other diseases; in setting bones, in locating foreign matter in the body, and in various diagnoses. Further, he pointed out that the X-ray is used to reveal distortion or internal strain in steel girders; to detect defects below the surface of castings such as gas cavities; by jewelers in detecting artificial stones and even by shoe merchants in fitting shoes.







Each received a certificate from the Texas A. & M. College and a sack of cottonseed meal from the West Texas Cottonoil Co. All boys and their dads present were given free pic-

ture show tickets. J. M. Williams was the principal speaker and talked on the control of field insects. He pointed out that in 1916 damage to crops in the United States amounted to about one billion dollars while in 1945 the loss was about three and a half billions. The speaker said there was not enough control work being done by agricultural people of the United States to reduce this damage. He suggested:

1. Crop rotation; 2. timely planting; 3. control of weeds; 5. clean farming; 5. burning refuse that harbors insects.

The new insecticide, DDT, was discussed at length, the speaker telling some of the known work of the new chemical on common farm insects of this area, what it will kill, and what it will not even harm. In conclusion Mr. Williams stated that insects must be controlled and that more and more work must be done each year to halt crop damage.

NO GOODFELLOW WORK TO BE DONE THIS YEAR

No plans were made here this year to help needy families. Leaders of previous Goodfellow campaigns in the past believe that few, if any, will need assistance this Christmas since work is more than plentiful and practically everyone is employed.

Origin of this hymn is controversial. When introduced in England about 1800 it was known as the "Portuguese Hymn." Its lines do not rhyme because they were translated from the Latin.

WHAT TO TELL YOUR FAMILY ABOUT SOCIAL SECURITY

If you are a worker who is building social insurance protection on the job, you should make it your business to TELL YOUR FAMILY about your social securty, said Elliott W. Adams, manager of the San Angelo Social ecurity Board office.

Tell them that if you die, they may be eligible for monthly oldage and survivors insurance bene-

Tell them that the law makes special provision for widows with children in their care. Show your family where you keep your social security card.

Tell them in case of your death o take it to the nearest Society Security Board office. There they will get all the help they need to file a claim for benefits-free of charge. Tell them to contact the Board office promptly. Monthly benefits are retroactive for only three months and they may lose some of their payments by delay. If they don't know where the Social Security Board office is, the postmaster will tell them.

TEXAS BEES INCREASE PRODUCTION THIS YEAR

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 19 .-Texas bees went into high gear this year and contributed 7.392,000 pounds of honey to the state's stock of sweetening. The bureau of agricultural economics, Austin, reports that this estimate of proof agriculture is 820,000 pounds larger than the yield in 1944. The BAE explains that the increase was due both to 9,000 more working colonies than last year and one pound larger yield per colony than one year ago. Favorable


