



That is the way W. E. Morgan onomist with the Texas A. and M. College extension service, has summed up the butter situation. Morgan explained that butte production has gone down steadily since 1942. Before that time almost half of the milk sold by farm or dairy for sale as cream which was used largely for butter while the skimmed milk remained on the farm. 

AUSTIN, January 9.- A tabulation of farm census data of the 254 counties of Texas, which was started several years ago, is being completed by the University of Texas bureau of business research and will be ready for distribution

in January. Sponsored by the bureau as a WPA project originally, work on the compilations was interrupted before the data was ready for publication. Last summer provision was made for the completion of the project and it is now in its

final stages. The tabulation is by counties for the census years 1900, 1910, 1920, 1925, 1930, and 1935, the 1940 census had not been taken when the project was set up, but summary data from the 1940 census has been added since for a few of the

Experiments Show Burning

To burn or not to burn is the question that many land owners ask themselves each spring. Usually they succumb to the impulse to "clean up the place." Drawn Poultry Constitutes 72 Per Cent of Weight

The Pennsylvania experiment station has answered the question of how much drawn poultry can be obtained from a thousand pounds of good fat live frying chickens. The experiment was carried on with well finished White Wyandotte cock-

Flesh constitutes 60.99 per cent; giblets, which includes heart, liver and gizzard, account for 4.49 per and the bones of the body slone, which are included in the drawn weight, account for 7.42 per cent, making a total of 72.9 per cent of the original live weight. This constitutes what food purchasers call the "yield" from 100 pounds of live poultry as purchased. It is emphasized that these were well fattened White Wyandotte cockerels of good market type, averaging about 51/2 pounds live weight.

Other data that may be of interest are that the blood, which was collected, amounted to 3.57 per cent, feathers 8.97 per cent, intestines 6.78 per cent, head and feet 7.78 per cent of the live weight.

Secret Service

All appointments of agents of the U. S. Secret Service are made from the top of a list of eligibles compiled by the U. S. Civil Service commission on the basis of a competitive examination. Names are listed in order of individual ratings plus any credits for veteran preference. The Civil Service commission re-quired an applicant for admission to the examination for treasury enhigh school education and at least two years' experience in major investigative work; tween 21 and 52 years of age, both clusive; with good vision, keen col character investigation. Marital status has no effect on eligibility.

Vapor Barriers

There are some basic precautions that should be followed to prevent the possibility of moisture condensation in the sidewalls or ceiling spaces after your house is insulated. There are a large number of materials on the market that are known as vapor barriers. One common form consists of a heavy building vapor that is impregnated with an asphalt coating to prevent any water vapor from traveling through the paper. Another form consists of a paper that is backed on one or both sides with a thin layer of metal foil. This vapor barrier should go next to the plaster. In other words, the vapor barrier is used to prevent any water vapor from getting out of the room into the space between the walls. The vapor is stopped after it passes through the plaster, and can go no further.

Efficient Dressmaking

Before pinning pattern pieces to thoroughly so there will be no mistake once the work is begun. Use a large surface for cutting. The kitchen table is usually adequate. Have pins in a convenient spot. A pincushion tied to the wrist is a handy device. Pin pattern together and try on, wrong side out. Adjust pins as necessary for proper fit. Baste as many seams as possible before stitching on the machine. Stitch as many seams as possible on the machine at one time. Use hand sewing only when necessary. Use tailor's chalk for marking purposes—it is the quickest method for marking silk, rayon, cotton, linen

On the bright side, farmers can expect more labor in the months ahead. Morgan says the total labor force in the country on the first anniversary of VJ Day will be about six million above what it was in August, 1945. This should bring about the only drop in farm production costs-the cost of farm labor. Production efficiency of farm workers greatly increased during the war and for a few years before, but for 1946 it is more likely to decline rather than rise, he believes.

On a long-time basis Morgan ays farm prices and production can remain at a high level, "if we can lick our unemployment problem by any means other than war." For the immediate future increased populaiton, high incomes for industrial workers, foreign purchases and UNRRA commitments should assure high consumption of farm products.

1946 Food Outlook For More Calories **But Less Vitamins**

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 23. American meals in 1946 probably will be higher in calories and lower in vitamins than in 1945 according to Miss Jennie Camp, assistant state home demonstration agent for the A. & M. College extension service.

Miss Camp explains that larger supplies of meats, fats and oils, and possibly sugar will raise the calories to about 3,500. "This is seven or eight per cent more than the average of prewar years and somewhat above 1945," she says.

The fact that incomes of a number of families will be lower influences the amount of vitamins in the diet. Lower income groups tend to buy less vegetables and fruits. For the same reason, Americans may drink less milk this year, which will mean somewhat less calcium and riboflavin in the
