meadows, according to R. R. Lancaster, pasture specialist of the Texas A. & M. College extension service.

Experiments underway since the spring of 1941 at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Red Plains conservation experiment station at Guthrie, Oklahoma, where grass sod was disked lightly every other year in March, caused an increase of 26 per cent in the yield of Bermuda grass, he said. The same treatment resulted in an increase of 6 per cent in yields from native bunch grasses.

The tests were made on thin of poor strands of grass. It was found that Bermuda would respond to heavier disking than the common native grasses. Tillage seemed to prevent the grasses from dying in the center of the clumps and increased the decay of plant residue






COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 6 .-Pasture grass seed may be purchased under the conservation materials program of the Production and Marketing Administration, B. F. Vance, state director, FMA's field service branch has announced.

Through this program eligible farmers can obtain a seed purchase order from the county ACA office where the purchase order plan is in operation. When he buys his seed, the farmer pays between the cost of the seed and the conservation practice payment and turns the purchase order over to the merchant for the balance. For example, the practice payment rate for the, use of Bermuda grass seed is 68 cents per pound. With an approved fair price of 75 cents per pound under the purchase order plan, the merchant selling the seed can the present the purchase order to the county ACA office, and he will receive a check for the PMA's part of the seed within approximately two weeks

Generally speaking, the conservation practice playment amounts to approximately 80 per cent of the cost of the seed, Vance said. Perennial pasture grass seed qualifying for payment under the program include Bermuda, rhodes, weeping lovegrass, crested wheatgrass, blue panic and buffalo. Of these seed, purchase orders can be issued for Bermuda, rhodes and blue panic. The other variaties must be paid for in full by the farmer, who will receive the amount of the conservation practice payment when his application for payment is approved.

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 6 .-The end may be in sight for static electricity in gins, according to F. E. Lichte, cotton gin specialist of the A. & M. College extension service.

When both cotton and air are very dry, static electricity is generated by the movement of cotton through the gin. In many West Texas points, Lichte says, static is often so bad as to force gins to stop work for several days at a time. Even if the gins can operate, the lint cotton is often so fluffy and resilent when it goes into the press that it is impossible to put out a bale of standard weight. Such cotton is penalized by the buyer.


The problem has been investigated by the U.S. cotton ginning laboratory at Stoneville, Miss., and preliminary tests indicate that a fine mist of water and sulphonated oil may be the answer. The mist, when sprayed on the cotton as it goes through the gin, has permitted both continuous operation and compression of bales to standard weight.

Lichte, who helped install the equipment for tests in several gins in Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, believes the mist will also result in an improved job of ginning.

Further tests are being conducted under supervision of the Stoneville laboratory.



just about a cow a minute. They were using the new correct milking method which often cuts milking time in half. Time and labor are saved, more milk is obtained, herd profits are increased, and the danger of mastitis is lessened. The new method can be used on herds of any size, whether machine or hand-milked.

To prepare your cows for a quick letdown of milk, first massage the udder vigorously for 20 seconds with a very warm cloth (130° F.), wrung out of a chlorine (250 parts per million) solution. Second, draw two or three streams from each quarter into a strip cup-which removes milk of high bacterial count and permits inspection for abnormal milk indicating mastitis. These two steps stimulate the cow's milk glands and cause her to let down in about 40 seconds. Milking should be started within a minute after udder massage and finished within four minutes, including brief stripping either by hand or machine. It is good practice to sterilize teat cups in a chlorine solution after each cow is milked.

Most cows respond to this correct milking method. Giving heifers an occasional udder massage before they freshen helps develop them into fast milkers. In the case of cows not previously trained for fast milking, most of them will respond to faster milking if milking time is shortened gradually to from three to four minutes.

An excellent illustrated circular which gives full details on this method of milking may be obtained from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin. Or inquiries may be made to your County agent or nearest Agricultural Experiment Station.



MINERAL SUPPLEMENT FOR WINTER FEEDING CATTLE

It has long been known that minerals are necessary for the health of animals and even for life itself. Those minerals most

likely to be lacking in winter feeds are calcium or lime, phosphorus, and common salt. Many of the roughages led to cattle may be short in minerals or grown on soils of low fertility. When cattle are fed such feeds, they must be supplied with a mineral supplement containing salt, lime and phosphorus. Also valuable in this mineral supplement are small quantities of other so-called "trace elements" such as cobalt, iron, manganese, copper and iodine. Although only small amounts of these latter minerals are needed, each plays a part in building a strong, healthy animal.







team machine-milked 54 cows in an hour. That's just about a cow a minute. They were using the new correct milking method which often cuts milking time in half. Time and labor are saved, more milk is obtained, herd profits are increased, and the danger of mastitis is lessened. The new method can be used on herds of any size, whether machine or hand-milked.

To prepare your cows for a quick letdown of milk, first massage the udder vigorously for 20 seconds with a very warm cloth (130° F.), wrung out of a chlorine (250 parts per million) solution. Second, draw two or three streams from each quarter into a strip cup-which removes milk of high bacterial count and permits inspection for abnormal milk indicating mastitis. These two steps stimulate the cow's milk glands and cause her to let down in about 40 seconds. Milking should be started within a minute after udder massage and finished within four minutes, including brief stripping either by hand or machine. It is good practice to sterilize teat cups in a chlorine solution after each cow is milked.

Most cows respond to this correct milking method. Giving heifers an occasional udder massage before they freshen helps develop them into fast milkers. In the case of cows not previously trained for fast milking, most of them will respond to faster milking if milking time is shortened gradually to from three to four minutes.

An excellent illustrated circular which gives full details on this method of milking may be obtained from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin. Or inquiries may be made to your County agent or nearest Agricultural Experiment Station.

MINERAL SUPPLEMENT FOR WINTER FEEDING CATTLE

It has long been known that minerals are necessary for the health of animals and even for life itself. Those minerals most

likely to be lacking in winter feeds are calcium or lime, phosphorus, and common salt. Many of the roughages fed to cattle may be short in minerals or grown on soils of low fertility.
