



factor was noted in an increase in cash buying, Timm says. Tenant buying which usually is low at this season, showed an increase over the previous year in two of the sample counties.

A more desirable trend was indicated in this quarter, however, in the fact that more buyers indicated intention to operate the tracts purchased and non-farmer sellers still were on the increase

Timm explains that during the war farm and ranch leaders in and out of the government cautioned about the consequences of the existing land boom. One of the hopeful signs for control was efforts to enact a stiff capital gains tax to stop speculative buying. The principle embodied was to tax away practically all of the the profits if a farm was resold within two years or some other specific during the emergency.

Ceiling prices also are under onsideration. But because of the many "variables" in a piece of farm real estate, ceiling prices probobly would effect only sales after "the next one." That is to say, the first sale would become the ceiling for the emergency period with allowance for improve

A third, or voluntary method, is through education. Throughout the war county agricultural agents and other farm leaders discussed causes and effect of land booms with their farmers. "An attack on the 'land boom' itself likely will bring little result," Timm says. The solution to the problem will

PROFESSOR THINKS ATOMIC ENERGY TO HAVE IMPACT ON TODAY'S WAY OF LIFE

AUSTIN, Mar. 13 .- How will the atomic bomb change the pattern of our lives? Dr. Harry F oure, assistant professor of sociology at the University of Texas, is now engaged in research on current articles dealing with atomic energy, and its effect on our lives and industries.

In reviewing an article by Prof. W. F. 

THE EDITOR'S COLUMN

T. G. Chase man, then wandered around the Yards, for it was his first trip to Chicago. Soon he was back, all excited—"Sell those steers right away for whatever you can get. There's not enough peo-ple in the world to eat all the cattle I've seen here!" The salesman managed to calm him down and

The salesman managed to calm him down and sent him downtown to see the city. He landed in the heart of Chicago, took one look at the crowd of people, and dashed into a drugstore to 'phone his salesman. 'Hold those steers of mine for the highest price. There's not enough meat in the world to feed all these people!"

This old story makes a good point. All of you know the price we can pay for your livestock is governed by what we can get for the meat and by-products. Also you know that what we can get for the meat and the by-products is greatly affected by the supply of livestock and the demand for meats. The ever-present problem among producers and meat packers is the matching of the supply with the demand, wherever the supply and demand may be. The job of nation-wide meat packers is to balance the supply of meat with the demand by efficient distribution of the meat to the places where people want to buy it.

KEEP EWES WITH GOOD FLEECES

by Dean J. A. Hill, University of Wyoming Before shearing time, range flock ewes should be carefully examined and the ones with poor fleeces marked for culling later. Experience in west-

ern states during 25 years has shown

that 20 to 30 % more wool per sheep can be obtained by the systematic selection of range ewes.

One livestock man reported that the average weight of fleeces from his flocks, of about 40,000 head, had increased nearly 3 pounds during a period of ten years of systematic culling in cooperation with the University of Wyoming. He got better lambs, too. Others report similar results obtained by searching out and discarding the ewes which are below standard in wool production.

With today's high costs, any range ewe which does not shear a big fleece of first-class wool is a money-loser. By a systematic examination, any flock master can find the ewes with fleeces which are one or more pounds less than the average of his flock. The agricultural colleges of practically all the western states are glad to help flock masters get started in a program of wool improve-



21,993 MORE TEXAS SCHOOL CHILDREN EATING NOON MEALS IN LUNCHROOMS

About 21,933 more shoool children are eating noon-day lunches in Texas community school lunchrooms now than they were this time last year, C. B. Hodges, assisant state director, production and marketing administration, Austin, announced.

Joint contracts between local sponsors and the United States department of agriculture already have been approved for 2,346 schools in which 262,576 children are served well-balanced lunches daily, compared with 2,173 schools and 250,583 children for the same period last year, he said. The community school lunch

program has increased steadily in

Texas since it first was introduced several years ago. Every lunchroom is a community project, relying on local non-profit sponsors for efficient operation. USOA reimburses sponsors up to certain amounts, according to the type lunch served and the sponsor's need for financial assistance. The school lunch program is a vital part of community life, Hodges said. It provides children with at least one-third of their daily food requirements for maximum growth and heatlh. Trails Missing Heirs, Finds 'Em

Gives 4,000 People Surprise Of Their Lives.

CHICAGO. - Walter C. Cox has

given 4,000 people the surprise of their lives. He's presented them with a total of more than five million dollars and it hasn't cost him a cent. een finding missing heirs for the last 32 years. He's searched as far as Syria and Greece to settle estates with values ranging from five thousand dollars to two million dollars. "Most of them can't believe it when they learn they are heirs." Cox said in an interview.

"In fact, most of them don't even know the relatives who left the

Sometimes Cox gets the surprise of his life, too, when an heir refuses to take an inheritance.

"It's hard to believe, but once in a while you find someone who would rather make his own fortune," said Cox, who calls himself the Henry Ford of heir hunters. "Obviously that doesn't happen

Once, however, he spent many months finding the wife of a prison guard to give her \$25,000. When he found her, the woman's husband wouldn't let her take the money. He'd been around criminals so long, he thought the whole thing was

"I got so angry I decided to prove to him that it was a bona fide offer, Cox said. "So I bought the woman" claim to the estate for a mere \$500. Cox said that was considerably more than he would have received for his trouble. The usual procedure, he explained, is for him to charge each heir a fee for making

Cox said that there are thousands of missing heirs largely because people don't make wills or make them out incorrectly.

"Not only are the heirs missing but their names are missing, too, he added. "First we find out who's missing and then we locate them. "Sometimes they lead us a merry chase, but we find most of them." He added that some of the deceased were "purely unintentional"

benefactors. "I'll bet some of them turn over in their graves when we find their unfavorite relatives," he said.

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

What Is The Strike About?

Wages are a basic issue. At the time of the strike, Harvester employes were among the highest paid workers in American industry. When the strike began, the average hourly earnings in the ten plants, not including overtime, were \$1.15%. If present wage proposals are adopted, this figure will become \$1.3314 per hour.

When the strike began, negotiations were broken off by the Union on the issue of compulsory union membership. The Company has no desire to weaken the Union. It recognizes certain reasonable needs of the Union. But the Company does oppose compulsory unionism. It feels strongly that an employe's membership should be a matter of his own choice.






