

To The People of Runnels County--

The Army of 1946 is far different to the one we knew after the end of World War I back in 1918. It is different in many ways; because it has a graver responsibility than any armed force the United States has ever maintained in a world of superweapons; because it has ceased to be a corps of men able only to march and shoot, and has been transformed into a service of highly training specialists dealing with the latest mechanisms and devices known to modern science. In brief, to serve and serve well, today's soldier of a necessity must be of a higher quality mentally and physically than our original concept of what it takes to be a soldier.

The sooner the public understands this, the earlier can we build the Army we need to enforce the peace, to maintain the proper backing for the United Nations Organization.

Today, however, with more skill required to fill a host of positions in the Army than is normally needed in civilian tasks, the caliber of men who belong is of the best.

Thus any young man today may consider an Army career as he would consider becoming a lawyer, doctor or merchant. It has acquired prestige and power. It has become, because of scientific development, a new component with a new aspect in the world of nations.

UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT AUSTIN April 3-Veterans make up 48 per cent of the spring semester enrollment at the University of Texas, the registrar's office reports, with 5,859 now enrolled out of a total registration of 12,- drought. 282 students. Men also outnumber women, the records show, with 8,165 men enrolled.

Peak enrollment for any one emester previously was in 1940-41, when 10,300 students were registered.

Approximately 150 additions have been made to the teaching and administrative staff since the first of the year, with the addition of new members, or of former members returning from military service.

Pre-fabricated hutments have solved the university's acute housing shortage to some extent, and to date \$417,953 has been expended for emergency housing for veterans, C.D. Simmons, comptroller, said.





In reporting on her landscaping demonstration, Mrs. Grady Richards, of Bethel, says: "Starting with a new yard I really had to start right down at the bottom. First the ground was covered with well rotted manure and broke deep, covered with sand and spaded well, and raked down level.

Next. I studied shrubs, differ ent kinds, proper places to put them, amount of water for different plants, and visited different places to see the shrubs growing so I would know how I wanted my yard to look. We drew plans on paper, gave the name of each plant a number, and as I put out each plant I listed the price and checked it off the list.


"I planted grass, but lost part of it due to dry weather and mowing too close when dry and hot. I have had fair luck with all shrubs I planted.



DALLAS, April 3.-Cotton offers tee said today.

Prospective plantings of other major feed crops in Texas for 1946, compared with 1945, indicate reductions of 8 per cent in corn, 10 per cent in all sorghums, 5 per cent in oats, 10 per cent in peanuts and 6 per cent in all tame hay, according to the U.S. department of agriculture.

"Increased cotton acreage and production can do much to offset these decreases in feed crop plantings by supplying more cottonseed meal, cake and hulls for livestock on Texas farms and ranches," the committee pointed out.
