





Paul's case of conversion is the only one recorded, after the ascension of Jesus, in which Jesus appeared to an unpardoned person. This may be considered a remarkable fact when viewed in the light of modern teaching and practice. How many prayers have been offered appealing to Jesus to "come down now," and this, too, when Paul, the only one to whom the ascended savior ever appeared before he was pardoned, speaking by apostolic authority on this subject, expressly forbids such pertitions, and assigns the reason for this prohibition. He says: "Say not in thy heart who shall ascend into heaven (that is to bring Christ down), or who shall descend into the deep (that is to bring Christ up again from the dead). It would seem from this that Paul anticipated "that in the latter time some shall depart from the faith." Hence he warns them not to conceive such an idea in their heart, but presents the all-sufficiency of "the word of faith, which we preach," and which he has delivered unto them to be "the power of God unto salvation."
