NATIONAL AWARDS ADDED FOR FOUR STATE WINNERS IN 4-H FOODS PROGRAM

Announcement is made that a highly prized opportunity has been added in the 1946 national 4-H frozen foods award program. State winners, who each receive a \$50 U. S. savings bond, will now also be considered for national honors. Four will be selected to receive the reward, which is an all-expense trip to the national 4-H club congress in Chicago. County winners' awards also provided by International Harvester Co. are gold-filled medals of honor. Participants learn what foods to

select and how to prepare and package them for freezing; also, how to get full use of their freezer space by recording rotation of foods into and out of the freezer, making periodic recording of storage temperatures and determining quality of product when used.

Last year's state winner in Texas was Alfred Neumann, of Bigfoot. County winners were named in Cameron, Camp, Cass, Fisher, Potter and Upshur counties.

This activity is conducted under the direction of the extension service. County extension agents will furnish full information.

The couple left on a wedding trip to San Antonio and Mexico. The bride wore a beige gabardine suit with brown accessories and an orchid corsage for traveling.

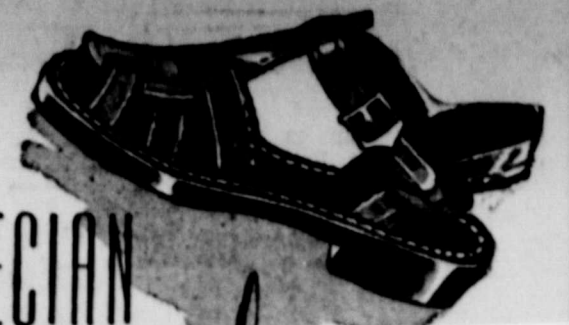

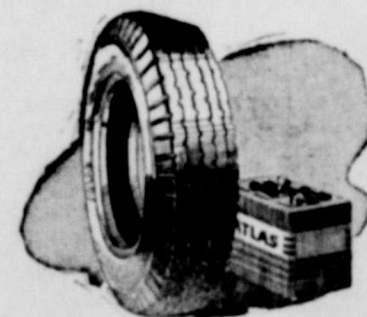

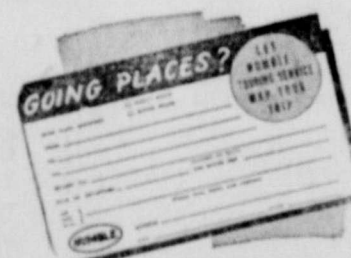

Texans will be asked to purchase \$22,000,000 in E bonds and already about one-fifth this amount has been taken. Savings bonds are just as good an investment as war bonds and in these days of more money than merchandise, tend to combat inflation. Money invested in these bonds will grow, paying back \$4 for every \$3 invested in ten years. The government needs the money now just as urgently as during the war and loyal Americans should meet the request and oversubscribe the quota. Savings bonds will be issued at banks and post-offices.

GOVERNMENT TO TAKE 60% OF CANNED MEAT PER WEEK FROM INSPECTED PROCESSORS

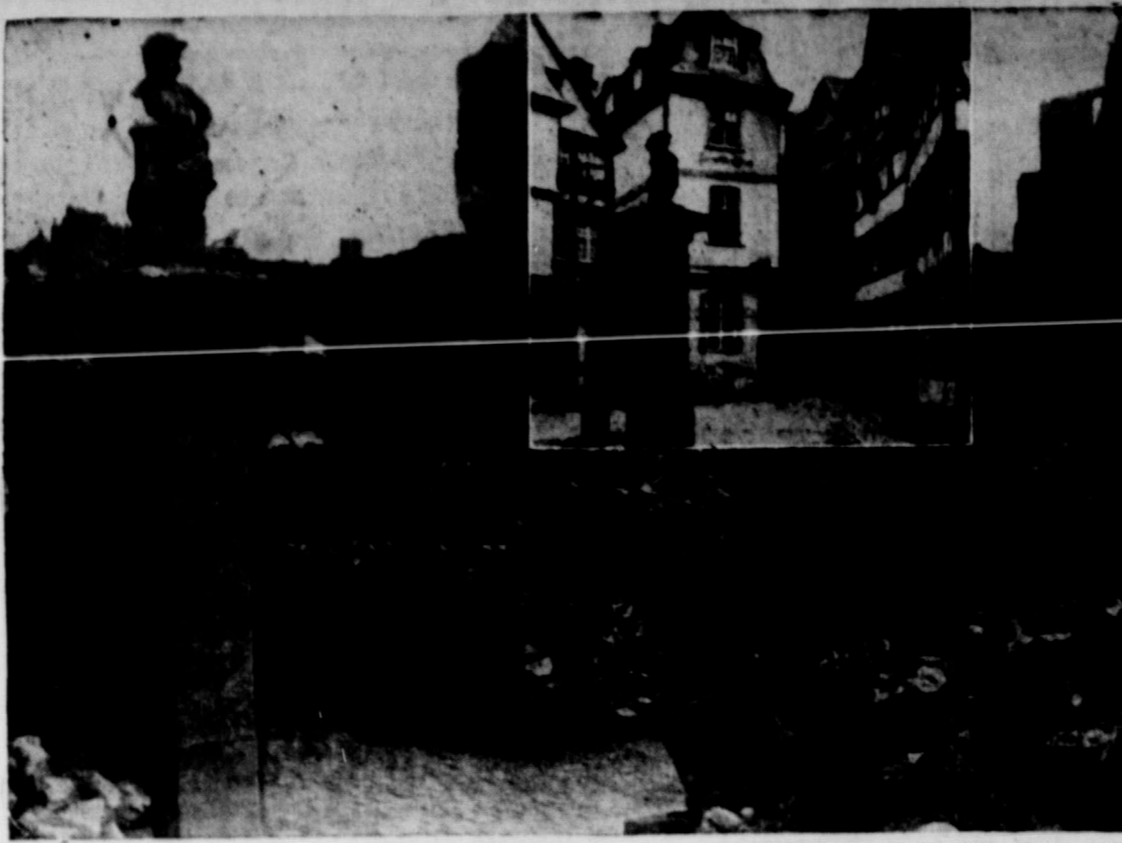
COLLEGE STATION, June 26.—Federally-inspected meat slaughterers and canners may not produce canned meat for civilian consumption unless they deliver to governmental agencies 60 per cent of each week's total output of canned meat. This is the essence of the new war food order designed to obtain more canned meat for foreign relief shipment.

U. S. department of agriculture reports state that the order applies to any canned food which contains 20 per cent or more of meat or meat by-products. Excluded from the order are vinegar pickled meats in glass, canned soup, mince meat, tamales, chow mein, chop suey, ravioli, meat extract, infant and junior foods.

Department officials said that the new order is designed as the most effective and feasible means of facilitating the procurement of canned meat during the next few weeks. Large quantities of canned meat are needed for foreign relief programs. Because of distribution problems encountered by the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, most of the meat required by that agency must be in canned form. The navy still requires relatively small quantities of canned meat, also.

LABORATORY EXPERT GIVES ADVICE ON DDT USE AGAINST POLIO OUTBREAKS IN SOUTH

WILMINGTON, Del., June 26.—"Community efforts to control disease-carrying insects can be effective only if individual households cooperate to the fullest extent," said Dr. Wendell H. Tisdale, manager of the pest control laboratory of the DuPont Co., in a special statement in reference to the use of DDT in current outbreaks of infantile paralysis in the South.

"To make present efforts in southern states fully effective," Dr. Tisdale said, "every household must check his own home first. Garbage piles, refuse piles, chicken coops, barns, and other possible breeding or feeding spots of flies outdoors are as important as those inside the home. There is a tendency too often to spray interior wall surfaces and window screens with DDT to the neglect of outside areas where insects continue to multiply unmolested. "DDT has great possibilities for

the current situation in the South," Dr. Tisdale continued. "Following its use on several hundred thousand people in Naples to quell an incipient outbreak of typhus during the war, the army and navy both adopted large-scale spraying programs in areas throughout the world. DDT has already been widely tested in Texas and Florida for the control of lice and horn flies on cattle with outstanding results. But no one can predict exactly the extent to which epidemics of diseases other than typhus and malaria can be checked through control of insects. We haven't enough experience with them.

"The best way for individuals to use DDT is to spray it on surfaces and areas inside and outside the home, which attract flies, fleas, mosquitoes, and other insects. When this is done, the powder residue which remains after the liquid spray dries is an amazingly effective insect killer. It will remain so for days and weeks—in some cases even months—depending on climate and weather. Sizeable areas can be covered without dissipating too much DDT in the air."

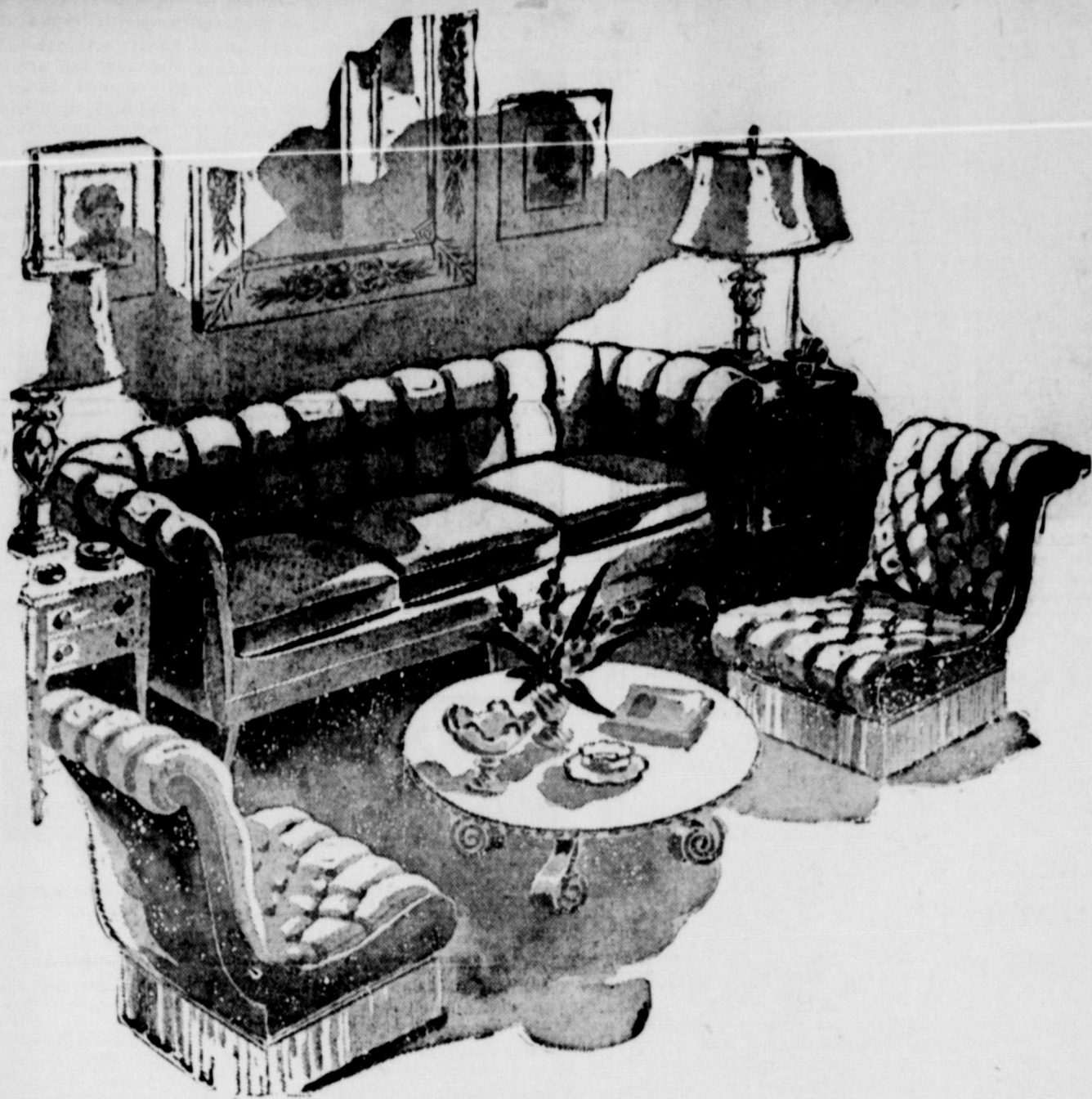

Preserve Peaches with Little or No Sugar

By Miss Ollie Chenoweth
County Home Demonstration Agent

Even though the June hail destroyed at least fifty per cent of the Runnels county peach crop there will be many peaches that should be preserved.

Peaches may be canned without sugar. Instead of the sugar syrup use plain boiling water or fruit juice which has been made by crushing or grinding the softer peaches. The juice may be strained if a clear juice is preferred.

Two methods of canning are recommended:

1. Pack raw peaches, in slices or halves, into clean sterilized containers. Pack these tightly because they will shrink while steaming. Pour syrup, water or
2. Drop peaches in boiling syrup or water. Bring to rolling boil, then drop into hot sterilized jars, leave one half inch head space, seal and process in water bath. Pints and quarts, 15 minutes; half gallons, 25 minutes.

Another method of preservation is drying. Drying is economical, takes less equipment and materials and may be stored in fewer con-

tainers, and can be transported easily. Peaches may be dried without peeling and without sugar. Peeled fruit will dry more quickly and is a nicer product. When drying, treat with sulphur or thiocarbamide in order to prevent discoloration of fruit.

To sulphur fruit: Place one teaspoon of sulphur per pound of prepared fruit in a small piece of paper, roll it loosely and twist the ends. Then place it in a pan. Place the pan below the tray or trays of cut fruit so they will not come into direct contact with the burning sulphur. Light the paper. Then quickly place a tight box or barrel over the trays and the pan. The covering should be tight enough to prevent loss of the fumes. This should be done out of doors.

Time Table for Sulphuring. Apples, 30 minutes; apricots, two hours; peaches or nectarines, 15 to 20 minutes, if peeled, 3 hours, if unpeeled; pears, 3 hours; plums, 20 to 25 minutes.

When using thiocarbamide, dissolve one level tsp. thiocarbamide in one gallon cold water. Allow peeled fruit to stay in solution one minute, then drain for 30 minutes to one hour before putting on drying trays.

Fruit may be dried by sun heat or controlled heat. Test for dryness: thoroughly dried fruits when pressed tightly will not be sticky, and will have a tendency to spring apart when the grip is released.

Proper storing is very important. Store canned products in cool, dark place. Heat all dried fruit 15 to 30 minutes at temperature of 150 F. to 180 F. to protect them from infestation by certain kinds of beetles and moths. Dried fruit can be stored in glass jars or cellophane bags. Seal containers and store in cool, dry place.

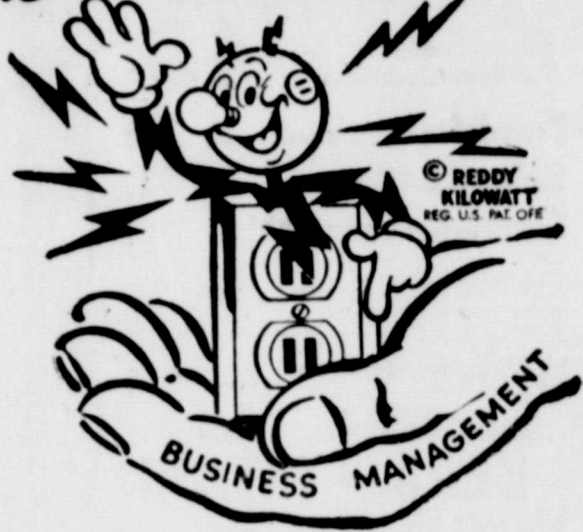

The plan was told in a General Electric science forum address over WGY and WGBM by Lt.-Col. H. R. Turner, commanding officer of the White Sands, N. M., proving grounds for the 46-foot rockets.

Col. Turner revealed that army ordnance engineers plan to send up 24 more rockets, in addition to the one that was successfully launched May 10. "That means," he pointed out, "if we follow our schedule, we'll celebrate the fourth of July about four times a month for the next five months at White Sands."

SIMPLE RULES ADVISED IN PREPARING MENUS FOR CAMP AND PICNIC

COLLEGE STATION, June 26.—Camping and picnic season is here in earnest and tasty menus for outdoor excursions must be planned. Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the A. & M. College extension service, says the task can be made easy with a few simple rules and some interesting recipes.

Meals should be kept simple. One main dish, possibly combining protein and starchy food, a crisp or chewy vegetable, one starchy food, and fruit for dessert will make a substantial meal. Beverages which can be prepared ahead of time or that require little preparation at camp should be served. Water should be taken along unless source of supply is

known to be safe.

MILL FEED PRODUCTION CUT DUE TO RECENT EXTRACTION ORDER AND WHEAT SHORTAGE

CHICAGO, June 26.—The effect of the current wheat shortage and the 80 per cent flour milling extraction order on mill feed supplies is illustrated significantly in his latest bureau of the census report on millfeed production, according to Herman Steen, of Chicago, vice-president and secretary of the Millers' National Federation.

Both mill feed and flour production slumped sharply in March, latest month of census records. The report showed mill feed production in March totaled 311,490 tons as against 316,450 tons in the preceding month. The decline was attributed to the shortage of wheat for domestic milling and the government order requiring that flour mills grind into flour 80 per cent of the cleaned wheat, including in the flour parts of the wheat which normally go into mill feeds for animals and poultry.

"This drop in mill feed production has aggravated the general feed shortage," Steen said. "Supplies for dairymen, hog raisers and poultry men have been far below normal requirements during

the past six months. I can foresee even greater difficulties for them in the months ahead. The higher extraction rate for flour milling means a reduction of about one-third in the production of mill feeds."

Flour production, according to the survey, also hit a low point during March. Flour mills averaged only 69.4 per cent of capacity, the poorest average for any month since August, 1944. More mills were idle during the month of March than in any other month of government record.

TWO CLUB ENCAMPMENTS PLANNED THIS SUMMER

Two encampments have been planned for Runnels county 4-H club boys during the summer. It is anticipated that a large group of club boys and leaders will attend the encampment at Lake

Brownwood in July. Information has been passed on to the clubs in this county and within a short time those desiring to make this event will be signed up and transportation arranged.

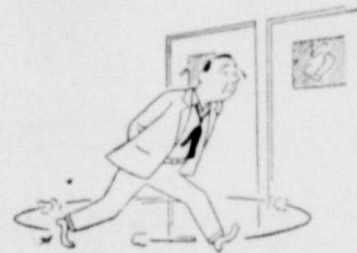
