

#### FACTS ABOUT WATER BONDS

Proposed lake will be on Valley Creek at one of four locations recommended by Engineers.

Proposed lake is smaller than that recommended by Engineers. Reason: the lake recommended is more expensive than the town can pay for. The smaller lake will be adequate for a town of more than 10,000 people after it has silted for 25 years without a serious drouth.

Proposed lake will have between 4,000 and 5,000 acre feet of water when filled. Our present Elm Creek lake has 240 acre feet when filled.

New lake will furnish about 700,000 gallons of water per day average pumping capacity.

Proposed lake will cover between 450 acres asd 600 acres of land.

Delivery date on pipe is estimated to be from 10 to 12 months from date order is placed. Construction of dam could be commenced as soon as contract is let. When lake is completed and distribution system installed as planned the insurance rates may be reduced by reducing the key rate 3 cents per \$100.00 if present rulles of Insurance Commission are in force at that time.

TAXES WILL NOT BE INCREASED nor will any tax obligation be placed upon the people of Ballinger. No tax money can be used for paying for the bonds.

WATER RATES WILL BE INCREASED. These are revenue bonds and must be paid from the pledged income from the sale of water by the City to the consumer.

#### FACTS ABOUT SEWER BONDS

City does not own present system. Present system is owned by Southwestern Sewer Company, Dallas, Texas. Present system serves only business part of town and small portion of residential area—and has about 400 connections in use according to their own statement.

City proposes to build system that will cover entire town as soon as materials will permit such an extension con-struction program. City will have to be slow in building system due to difficulties in obtaining materials of this type. City will build system as fast as materials can be obtained at a reasonable price.

City will pass appropriate sewer and plumbing ordin-ances requiring each dwelling in city to be properly con-nected to a private sewage disposal system that will pass State Health Department requirements, or be connected with

Southwestern Sewer Company, or be connected with City's system. The health of the City must be protected by one of these connections. Those connected with Southwestern Sewer Company will not be required to change to the City's

The rates of the City's system tentatively will be the same as the rate now employed by Southwestern Sewer.

Health authorities advise us much of our sickness is due

TAXES WILL NOT BE INCREASED nor will any tax obligation be placed upon the people of Ballinger to pay for the sewer bonds. No tax money can be used to pay for

Sewer bonds will be paid from income from the sewerage.

#### FACTS ABOUT WATER AND SEWER BONDS AFTER ISSUANCE

If both issues carry one series of bonds will be issued for an amount sufficient to care for the estimated needs of the city. The first bond will be due September 1, 1948. The bonds will bear a rate not in excess of 2½% payable semi-annually. The bonds will be paid from revenue only, and none from taxes. The average amount required to pay the bonds per year is estimated at \$28,500.00. The margin of need above income is estimated at 1.6% for the first year. Bond men tell us this is adequate. The bonds are to mature over a period of not in excess of thirty years, perhaps less.

#### FACTS ABOUT STREET BONDS

More applications are now pending for street paving than there are funds available from the last issue. These cannot be completed if additional bonds are not voted, and money paid in by property owners will have to be refunded.

The proposed use of these bonds is as follows:

1. Complete the present pending applications on file.

Pave locations beneficial to the majority of citizens in which adjacent property owners are not materially bene-

3. Pave such additional streets or alleys as funds will permit as applications are filed on a selected basis of need to the most people.

The issue will require a tax of 10c per \$100.00 valuation. It is expected taxes for 1947 will not have to be increased above the \$1.40 rate for 1946 to pay the bond requirements.
