City will be required to accumulate during the first five years after issuance of bonds a surplus sufficlent to cover one annual payment of principal and interest. These rates will be effective immediately if the issue is voted. Water bonds will be \$375,000.00 not to exceed  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ . 30 years, with 15-year option. A lower rate or a shorter term may be obtained when bids are taken.

SEWER BONDS will not be tax bonds. NO TAXES will be required to pay for these bonds. These will be paid from revenue from the sewer system. Anyone who is not connected with the city system will not be required to pay anything on these bonds.

Anyone connected with the present system operated by Southwestern Sewer Company may remain with that company as long as it operates with approval of the State Health Department. Anyone having a septic tank that operates in accordance with the requirements of the State Health Department will not be required to connect with the City Department will not be required to connect with the City sewer system, but such person may connect with either sewer system. Those whose private sewer system or sewer connection is endangering the health of the community will be required to connect to the city system or some other Health Department approved sewer system. The purpose of the City sewer system is not to make money but to protect the health of the community. It would be an eye-opener to anyone to inspect the present contamination in the Colorado River as a result of waste from the town.

Rates on city's sewerage system will be the same as the present rates of Southwestern Sewer Company.

Sewer bonds will be \$225,000.00 not to exceed 245.3. 30 years, with 15 year option. A loweer rate is believed obtainable when bids are taken.

Water and sewerage plants and distribution systems may be included in a mortgage to additionally secure the bonds if a better sale of the bonds can be made. The issue is submitted so that the Commission can select the best method of financing the bonds, either from revenue only or from revenue and mortgage on the systems; but no taxes can be used for this purpose.

Interest rates are now low. Construction costs are high. One probably offsets the other. Bonds voted when construction is cheap will probably bear a higher interest rate. Interest rates and construction costs are speculative.

STREET BONDS are tax bonds. These will be \$50,000.00 not to exceed 24.%, 30 years. It is very probable these will be 2%, 20 year bonds, when sold, by adding same to the recently issued 1946 Street Bonds. It is expected taxes for 1947 will not have to be increased above the \$1.40 rate for 1946 to pay the bond requirements on this issue. 
