



Cut in mind that a variety of trees pleasure against plant diseases. airtight container for ship- says Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardening specialist of the Texas A. & M. College extension service. Names like "The Crepe Mytle City" may sound romantic, says Miss Hatfield, but it is risky to put out solid plantings of only one kind of tree. At the same time, it is easy to permit one type of tree to predominate a memorial planting without making a solid planting of it. "Putting all your eggs in one basket," in connection with tree planting, it not a good idea, as folks in West Texas will testify in recalling the heavy ice storm a few years back that ruined the popular Chinese elms and did only slight damage to the

less popular green ash. Due to solid plantings that have been made in a number of cities in Texas, many of these places would look desolate for years if an uncontrollable disease should strike that particular type tree, Miss Hatfield points out. For instance. Chinese elms may be endangered by the Dutch elm disease, which is now killing trees in the eastern United States.

There are many shade trees that are well adapted to all of Texas, and from which a well-balanced planting may be made. Some of these are the black walnut, thornless honey locust, Chinese jujube, small leaf Chinese elm or parvifolin elm.

Among the hardy evergreens, the red cedar and ponderosa or western yellow pine will thrive on very little moisture and make excellent windbreaks. Austrian pine pine is nearly as hardy in areas of scant rainfall. Desert willow, tamarix or salt cedar, peach, plum and cherry are others that will do well in areas of slight rainfall as well as sections where abundant moisture falls. In general, says Miss Hatfield, it is safe to select a native or hardy plant that has




Ways of doing livestock work easier, faster and better are especially needed. Most farmers still use almost as much work to make 100 pounds of pork, beef or milk as they did 25 years ago. Yet, thanks mostly to machinery, we have reduced crop work one-fourth to one-half during the last 25 years.

Alert farmers are simplifying farm jobs, cutting chore time 15 to 50 percent. Five Indiana farmers, by carefully planning their work, are raising market hogs with one-quarter the average hours of labor. A Minnesota farmer rearranged his barn, adopted correct milking practices, saved 300 hours of work and 138 miles of walking a year. By rearranging his watering system, a poultry man saved 22 miles of walking a season. Some farmers are making hay in 90 man-minutes per ton. Others, using similar equip-ment but harder ways of working, spend twice the time.

What these farmers are doing, others can do, too. Know just what you want to accomplish. Figure out how to do a job the easiest, cheapest and best way. Cut out those unnecessary steps, combine jobs, rearrange barns and lots, work out more convenient chore routes, keep equipment busy, choose new equipment that suits your farm. Give new practices a fair
