They may do so before this date by making a comparative health statement and by paying only two premlum payments, at the rate of the effective date.

They may pick up all, or any part, in units of \$500, so long as the minimum amount of \$1,000. A veterans' administration contact representative, Joe B. Fry, will be at the AAA office in Ballinger next Thursday afternoon from 1 to 3 o'clock to aid any veteran in preparing the papers, or will answer any question submitted.
