(1) It aids in absorption and storage of moisture in the soil for the use of plants. This is true whether the water comes from rain, sprinkling or irrigation.

(2) Organic matter is the best -around soil conditioner. It makes heavy clays easy to pulverize and cultivate, and sandy soils more loamy and capable of holding water

(3) Well rotted organic matter supplies some plant food. Manure furnishes a good deal, and also makes chemical fertilizers more efficient.
