DISCOVERED WHEN FLOOR COLLAPSES IN HOG HOUSE

COLLEGE STATION, Mar. 26. A faulty foundation in a hog farrowing house in Kentucky has paved the way for swine breeders in saving the lives of little pigs.

It happened like this: Way up in Kentucky, a foundation in a swine breeder's house gave way and let one side of the floor down. A few days later, a little of pigs was born in the house, and the slanting floor proved a life saver for a lot of them. It cut down the danger of the young pigs being crushed by their mother.

E. M. Regenbrecht, swine husbandman of the Texas A. & M. College extension service, says the

The idea takes advantage of two simple facts in the behavior of pigs. One-on a sloping floor, a sow prefers to lie with her back to the high side. Two-clumsy little pigs stagger a bit the first few days, and even on a slightly sloping floor tend to tumble to the low side. The life saving is as as that. When the mother pig is ready to lie down, she usually chooses the high side of the pen, and the little pigs are just as likely to be bunched up on the low side. The slanting floor arrangement cuts down the chances of the sow's lying down on and crushing one or several


