



You can use either a dust mixture that contains three per cent DDT, or the wettable powders that mix well with water for spraying. Since the commercial wettable powders vary in the amount of DDT they contain, use them according to the manufacturer's directions on the package. Remember that it's not wise to use DDT in oils or emulsions.

If you've got lice on your potatoes, you can mix rotenone with the DDT so that the dust mixture contains three per cent DDT and .5 per cent rotenone.






