The estimated record wheat crop coming up is due to affect the distribution of sugar to Texas store shelves.

The U.S. department of agricu ure has urged the nation's homemakers to cash their sugar stamps -numbers 11 and 12-as soon as possible. While the total year's supply of sugar for the nation, estimated earlier at about 6,800, 000 tons, remains unchanged, the distribution of the supply is another question, USDA says. The large wheat crop is expected to create a difficult transportation problem. In another month, there will not be enough box cars to carry both

When seasonally adjusted the index of crushings shows a 32 per cent March-to-April hike, since the drop was much smaller than is usually experienced at this time of year. Between March and April last year cottonseed crushings dipped 44 per cent.

Crushed in April

Crushings also stayed 17 per cent above the April, 1946, level to total 22,876 tons, although the index stood at 54.7 in April compared to 100 for the pre-war years 1935-39.

April receipts at mills in the state soared to 143 per cent above March receipts and were seven times greater than in April of last year

Stocks at the end of April stood at 26,931 to sag 30 per cent below March stocks. However, the end of the month saw stocks 24 per cent above those left on hand in April, 1946.







HOW THE "UMBRELLA" FILTER ELEMENT WORKS

The element is made of two large sheets of special creped, impregnated cellulose - accordion folded to form a double-walled cylinder. 


