

County Agent John A. Barton stated the first of the week that reports were coming to his office indicating that cotton flea damage in the county was greater than at first suspected. Many farmers have started dusting their cotton with a number using the airplane for fast work.

Some fields inspected showed a number of the older squares killed by the fleas Mr Bart that these were the most likely to make cotton and that each old square lost was just that much otton lost this fall.

Farmers are urged to keep a close watch on their fields and to start dusting at the first signs of damage. Mr. Barton stated that early in the morning is the best time to dust and would prove the most effective. At that time each day the cotton plant will retain more of the dust and the fleas as well as any eggs on the plant. Card of Thanks
