



Business Holds Own In State During First Six Months of Year


AUSTIN, August 20 .- Business activity in Texas remained practically unchanged during the first six months of 1947 at a level somewhat above the last six nonths of 1946. The University of Texas' bureau of business' composite index of business activity for the first half of 1947 averaged 189.4. in comparison with an average of 184.4 in the last six months of 1946, and 172.7 in the first half of 1946. The February value of 191.7 represented a postwar high for the index, after a steady rise with only minor setbacks since the reconversion low point of October, 1945. In June the index had slipped to 190.1. At least, the record for the year to date shows that the rise in business activity has lost its momentum, and past experience indicates that such a leveling off is ollowed by a downturn. There is nothing in the present picture of business to indicate a resumption of the rapid rate of increase shown last year. Whether or not a turn downward is imminent is more questionable.

For the country as a whole business activity also leveled off and registered some slight declines; however, the boom level of durable consumer goods and the great excess of exports over imports have to date held off any period. ubstantial decline in volume. date have been slight, very much sales of jewelry stores were down months of 1946. as in the index of Texas business activity. A general feeling of optimism is apparent among business men, as many are beginning to believe that the predicted recession in 1947 has been avoided. However, the leveling off and slightly downward trend of the important business indexes suggest that this optimism may be unwarranted, and that business is not yet out of the weeds of a major adjustment. One of the most significant

changes in the business situation during the last six months has been the slowing down in the rate at which consumers have been spending their money.
