the opening of the Ballinger public schools on September 8. At mercial that time 53 teachers will start work on the new salary scale made possible the past summer by the passage of legislation known as the equalization aid bill and also by the raising of state aid to \$55 per capita

The average increase for teachers in the Ballinger system is approximately \$800 per year. Some teachers with long experience will receive from \$1,000 to \$1,200 more this year than last year. This will bring the annual teacher salary budget to \$129,996. Local teachers with degrees and no experience will draw \$2,007 and others with years of experience will draw as high as \$2.665.

This year the district has scholastics of 1,644 and with administrative costs off, it is expected to receive from state aid \$87,132. The 50 cents from the local tax collections which must be included in teachers' salaries will total \$17,000. This will make a total of \$104,632 and leave a deficit of \$40,560 to be paid from the state equalization fund. In addition to the above amounts the district will be allowed \$300 per teacher for general expenses of operation Sixty cents of the local tax collections will be available for general purposes and the other 40 cents collected locally will be applied on the bond accounts now outstanding.
